# Sinai and Zion: Shavuot and Tishah B'Av

The faith of Judaism is deeply linked to the physical existance and well-being of Jews.

THE TWO MOUNTAINS THAT LOOM LARGE IN THE

religious imagination of the Jewish people are Sinai, associated with the Giving of Torah and the Festival of Shavuot, and Zion, the point of pilgrimage which was destroyed on Tishah B'Av. In his superb study, *Sinai and Zion: An Entry into the Jewish Bible*, Jon Levinson explores the traditions and theological significance of each place.

Sinai is the mountain of Moshe, where a covenant (brit) was established to follow the mitzvot of God. Each spring, as we count the days from Pesah to Shavuot, the journey of Israel to Sinai becomes the journey of every Jew. Our remembered history presents the people of the covenant with a reminder of the Sinai stipulations as a sign of God's love. The Sinai covenant is compared to a marriage between the Holy One and Israel, the culmination of a passionate love affair between the One who promises deliverance and those who praise their redeemer. Mitzvot become our signs of the love of the covenantal relationship, and prayer, particularly the cycle of berakhot surrounding the Sh'ma, brings each person into the covenant of Sinai by renewing the love, receiving again the Torah and restoring the words of the Torah in the lives of our people.

Zion was the site of the Mikdash (Temple), the ritual centre of ancient Israel and the capital of the Davidic monarchy, where "God shall be sovereign for eternity". The geographic reality of Mount Zion means that the divine Presence will be linked with human history and the Davidic covenant, seen as leading to the fulfilment of the historical and theological promise of national and cosmic peace. At the same time, the passionate desire to abide forever in the house of the Eternal emphasizes the significance of correct moral conduct. In Zionism, the vision of Jewish restoration is linked to the divine promise to provide a home-Zion/Jerusalem/the Land of Israel-where the national centre and the spiritual centre are joined. As Levinson explains, the physicality of Sinai has been merged into Zion, but the message that Zion represents remains that of Sinai.

As I explain in interfaith discussions, the faith of Judaism, particularly following the Holocaust, is deeply linked to the physical existence and well-being of Jews. The geographic and theological are brought into physical and spiritual relationship. The State of Israel is a nation-state comparable to other political entities, but it is also tied to the spiritual memory and religious aspirations of Judaism. That is why we fight so hard to defend Israel against external military-diplomatic challenges and can be so critical—*entre nous*—of its cultural-religiouseducational policies.

We take international efforts—whether by members of the British Labour Party, the more radical BDS movement or university students unwilling to allow Israelis to speak unimpeded on campus—to delegitimate Zionism as more than a political attack on the State of Israel. We know that disinformation about Israel planted by the KGB ceased when the former Soviet Union collapsed. We recognize that the perfidious resolution of the United Nations equating Zionism with racism was withdrawn. Yet we see residual remnant remains from each previous effort in the form of an ongoing, relentless effort to besmirch the State of Israel and its leaders. This is a new expression of the "oldest hatred".

Although the leadership of Yasser Arafat has been widely discredited, his statement to President Bill Clinton during the 2000 Camp David Summit that "Solomon's Temple was not in Jerusalem" was recently repackaged in a UNESCO resolution that denied any Jewish attachment to the Temple Mount and identified the Western Wall with quotation marks. Yossi Klein Halevi commented that "the UNESCO resolution gives tacit legitimacy to the Palestinian terror campaign of recent months, ignores the fact that Israel bars Jews from praying on the Mount [and] that Palestinian groups have systematically destroyed ancient Jewish artifacts at the site. But most of all, the UNESCO resolution erases us from our own story. Of all the attempts to destroy us throughout our history, the campaign against history itself is the most devious."

This effort to erase Jewish history is a cunning contemporary restatement of the 20<sup>th</sup> century European canard: "You have no place here". Because of our theological tie to Mount Zion, this represents an attack on our faith and on the fidelity of generations who have continued to yearn for Zion.

I have become increasingly concerned about caring and devoted Jews who have become sincere and strong critics of Israel. I am not referring to disagreement about

specific Israeli policies; I myself diverge from many Israeli governmental decisions. I am pointing to fault-finding which is so broad-scale that it confuses careful criticism with censure and condemnation.

Thus Rabbi David Gordis, formerly of the American Jewish Committee and Boston Hebrew College, declares that:

The Israel of today is very far from anything I dreamed of and worked for throughout my career. ...Israel in my view has gone astray. ...The political culture is rotten. ...The spiritual culture is rotten. ...Present day Israel has discarded the rational, the universal and the visionary. ...I conclude that in every important way Israel has failed to realize its promise for me. A noble experiment, but a failure.

His article in *Tikkun* magazine is an example of what the late Fred Iklé and US Senator Daniel Moynahan called "semantic infiltration", the adoption of terms of reference which others use to criticize and attack your position. David Gordis has inadvertently adopted the absolutist language of anti-Zionism.

Recently, Rabbi Daniel Gordis, criticized his uncle's concern for the personal rather than the Zionist emphasis on the collective. Israel "was created to transform the existential condition of the Jewish **people** [my emphasis] —and, despite its many failings (like the failings of America and other decent countries), it has done just that, and brilliantly."

In theological living, it is vital to hope for and aspire toward the ideal. But in the political life of a community, it is critically important to understand the significance of accommodation and inclusion which may lead to compromised, non-utopian decisions. The distinction between compromise and what Avishai Margalit terms "rotten compromise" has already been lost by many religious nationalists who imagine that Israel must be "a nation that dwells apart". We are now seeing a similar development among theological liberals who emphasize a personal spiritual path to holiness; anything less is a "rotten compromise".

While the covenantal ideals of Sinai are aspirational, the pathway of *mitzvot* is incremental. Although the visionary promise of Zion remains, we recognize that this world is messy, not yet messianic. The pursuit of the ideal should not blind us to the length of time and the many trade-offs required to sustain a community in the interim. As Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel observed, "At the end of days, evil will be conquered by the One; in historic times, evils must be conquered one by one."

There remain huge challenges for the tiny state. No one lives in a perfect country. The Israelis I know are constantly striving to lessen the gap between the ideal and the real, the paragon of perfection and the daily duties of life. Zion remains an aspirational hope to be reached by the long trek through the Wilderness from Sinai.

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# Kadima: Moving Forward

Blake Teichman shares his reflections on his past two years as President of the Congregation.



**AS I WRITE THIS COLUMN, I LOOK BACK ON MY TWO YEARS** serving as President of our Congregation, which will conclude at the end of this month. I end my term as President with our financial affairs in good shape. Over the past six years, the Board of Governors and our staff have eliminated a significant operating deficit, and I'm pleased that we have brought our operating budget into balance. The investments of the Congregation and its Foundation have increased by \$5.6 million over the last five years, reaching \$21.9 million. This reflects the generosity of our membership and the wise stewardship of our Investment Committee.

Keeping with this theme of prudent financial stewardship, as Ronnie Faust and Harold Wolfe (of our Investment Committee) recently reported to the membership, our investments have been earning an average of six per cent per year over the last five years. Given current borrowing rates of three percent, Ronnie, Harold, members of the Budget & Finance Committee and our Treasurer, Peter Weinstein, suggested that borrowing to finance our current renovations made more sense than liquidating portions of our investments. Accordingly, the Board passed a by-law amendment to increase the borrowing capacity of the Congregation from \$1 million to \$5 million, to be repaid using investment income, annual contributions to the Building Fund and other amounts contributed to Beth Tzedec. However, the amendment is not effective unless it receives membership support by a two-thirds vote at a general meeting of the members. Approval will be sought at the May 31 Annual General Meeting.

Our Strategic Planning Committee, co-chaired by Larry Wallach and Carolyn Kolers, will be working over the coming weeks to complete a strategic plan to help guide our Congregation. The Committee, composed of 18 synagogue members and supported by two professional consultants, received close to 1,000 responses to our membership survey. This membership input will be matched with insights learned from consultation with the membership, the larger community and experts within the Conservative movement, as well as data concerning our past operations, to help the committee develop a five-year strategic plan for presentation to the Board. Once the plan is approved by the Board, it will be shared with the Congregation, and an implementation plan will be created, including an agreed method of measuring our success in achieving agreed-upon goals.

In the past two years, with the help of Stephen Kauffman's passion and energy, the first phase of our renovations has progressed from vision to construction. Our new second floor banquet hall, able to accommodate 300 people, is progressing well and we expect to be finished prior to the upcoming High Holy Days. Our members will soon have a light-filled elegant, modern room in which to celebrate their *smahot*.

As Norman Kahn reported to the Congregation at the April 12 Special General Meeting, commencing a rabbinic search in 2016 was inopportune for a variety of reasons. As a result, the Board asked Rabbi Frydman-Kohl to defer his retirement plans by two years. We were thrilled when he agreed to remain as our spiritual leader until the summer of 2019. The overwhelmingly positive response from our membership reflects the special place that Rav Baruch plays in our community as our religious leader and cherished friend.

Over the coming months, we will be moving to retain the services of a Cantor to lead us in prayer for the upcoming High Holy Day services and we will commence a search to find a new permanent Cantor to serve our Congregation in the years ahead. As with past cantorial searches, we will be forming a Cantorial Search Committee, and we invite those members with an interest or a special knowledge of cantorial music to share their insights. We also hope to host a special event to celebrate the contributions of Cantor Spiro to Beth Tzedec.

At the upcoming Annual General Meeting on Tuesday, May 31, the membership will elect 10 people to the Board of Governors. I applaud the work done by our Nominating Committee, consisting of members of the Board and the membership at large. The four new nominees identified by the Nominating Committee bring a wealth of governance and leadership experience from the broader community. Together with the current Board members, who have experience with the issues facing Beth Tzedec, they have the talent and the skills to help move our shul forward in a positive direction.

To all who have helped me along the way, *todah rabbah*. My fellow Board members, those who serve on committees and our staff put in tremendous amounts of time into helping our shul meet the needs of our members. While differences arise, our objective is to strengthen our shul as an institution of prayer and

learning, and move forward in a positive direction. In particular, I want to acknowledge and thank Sheldon Rotman, who has served alongside me as Chair of the Board over the past two years. We have worked cooperatively and collaboratively, and I wish him much success, as he continues to work hard for the benefit of our wonderful shul. As the Psalmist reminds us, we go from strength to strength.

# Dear Grandpa ...

Wherever I am, you are never very far away.

#### IT HAS BEEN SO MANY YEARS SINCE I HAVE HAD YOU

across from me, as you sat beside your son on Seder night. After synagogue, when we came home, we were struck by that most wonderful combination of smells that signaled a feast was soon to begin. I remember, though it is faint now, waiting to hear your Kiddush, chanted with a passionate, scratchy throat.

I remember being poked and prodded—some might say encouraged—to say the *fier kashes* I learned in *heder*. It took me years to figure out that you would not answer my simple questions with as few words as they were asked. I remember being woken up to search for the *afikomen* and hoping to earn a reward for the discovery, though I rarely made the find. I remember that father had a special treat for all who searched, a tradition I renew with your great-grandchildren.

I remember watching as everyone tried to sing every verse of *Ehad Mi Yodeyah*—Who Knows One in one breath. And while I remember that father claimed he could do it with ease, I cannot honestly say that I ever saw him do it. It was many years before I had the wind to do it myself, and as the years move on, I once again struggle with the feat.

I remember staring without blinking, as the door was open to Eliyahu and I was sure that I could see the wine in that beautiful crystal cup go down. I also remember, with horror, the time that your daughter-in-law, my auntie, did the unthinkable while most were not looking —she took a sip!

Turning back the pages, it has been years since we were able to light Hanukkah candles together in shul or sing the blessings together over the phone. I feel the oil from the latkes on my fingers and how I marveled at the delicate *kreplach* and other unique foods that came out of the tiny kitchens of our relatives. I still feel the pinching of my cheeks by your sister and wonder why a person would possibly think to "eat up" a child, until of course I had my own. You did not speak English as your first language and I could not understand your Yiddish nor the Yiddish of your children as you all told stories and made plans so that we the next generation, could not understand.



I recall the sleepy car ride late at night when your children dragged us from our small town to the big city to pray at midnight, before Rosh Hashanah. I remember the booming, powerful voice of Misha Alexandrovich who came from slavery to freedom and made many in the congregation cry. I remember wondering why it took so long to sing a few words and if falling asleep smiling to great *Hazzan* was part of the ritual. I remember hearing *Ha-melekh!* from the back of the room on Rosh Hashanah morning, and the robes, striding to the *bimah*, to lead us in prayer. We were as one people—with one voice, one future, one destiny—and you taught me through the generations to embrace my community and to be much more than a spectator.

It bothers me that I can't remember the last time we went to the sukkah together to make the special *brakhah* over the tough hard boxer I had to eat. But I remember coming from the service to the sukkah in blowing snow! Why, I asked, would God want us to freeze when we could really thank Him for giving us a synagogue with heat?

Vividly I recall sitting at the dinner table as your son was called to the telephone and then took me along to *daven* at the house of one I did not know. It was a shiva house, I learned later, and while I was unaware then, you engaged me in yet another *mitzvah* that extended the walls of the shul. It is a sad tradition that brings comfort and maintains the connectedness of one to another.

I think back to when when we sat in synagogue and I could listen as you joined the *Hazzan* in prayer. You tolerated us as we *kitzeled* each other (or whacked each other, as the case may have been). Sometimes, you stood on the side and prayed out loud. Your prayers were personal but part of the sacred community. You were a leader of many, without ever asking for the mantle of leadership.

You introduced the generations to the synagogue. You tied us together with music and prayer. It has been so long since we sat together but when I lie down and when I rise up, when I walk along the way and

especially now when we again receive the Torah on Shavuot, wherever I am, you are never very far away.

# Why I'm Staying in Toronto



#### SOME PEOPLE SPEND THEIR LIVES

waiting. Others spend their lives running to try to catch up. Time is a funny thing that way, going by too fast and too slow, depending on what you do with it.

It is an absolutely surreal feeling to be writing what is to be my final *Bulletin* article for Beth Tzedec. These past 11 years have felt, at the same time, like a blink and a lifetime.

When I first came to Beth Tzedec in 2005, I thought I would be here for one year. My first contract was simply for me to see how I would like life in Toronto, and if I would like it at all. Little did I know that I would discover a city with a singular Jewish community, where it is easy to be Jewish, where both the religion and the culture are embraced and celebrated.

I don't believe that there are other cities in North America which boast a Jewish film festival, a Jewish theatre company, a Jewish book fair, a full week of events to commemorate the Holocaust, two Jewish music festivals, countless Jewish choirs for adults and children, a unique Jewish arts organization like Koffler, Jewish community centres bursting with activity and synagogues and day schools for every type of Judaism on the spectrum.

Although there were many opportunities to take a Cantorial position in another city, Aliza and I agreed that we wished to remain in Toronto.

Aliza always says, "If you have a small vision, you'll have a small life." She and I look forward to continuing our vision within this beautiful community. I thank you for your friendship. I'll keep an eye out for you. You'll do the same, won't you?

# Reflections on Shabbat Itanu

The beauty of adult learning is the opportunity to ask questions that don't occur to children and use methodologies inappropriate for adololescents.

#### ON MAY 14, BETH TZEDEC CELEBRATED SHABBAT ITANU,

a North America wide annual initiative to honour those in our community with accessibility/inclusion needs, and to push our community, both Beth Tzedec and the Jewish community generally, to be more inclusive of Jews with varying degrees of ability. As always, we reached out to members who may feel excluded from the synagogue whether because they are wheelchair-bound, have limited eyesight or are not neuro-typical—and offered *aliyot* and other honours. The theme of inclusion was addressed from the pulpit.

For years, Shabbat Itanu intentionally coincided with the reading of the double portion of *Tazria-Metzora*, *parshiyot* that focus on the lived reality and outsider status of Israelites with various ailments. In many ways, it was an appropriate Torah selection as it made the shulgoer confront how our ancestors understood physical disability, and how our approach may differ today. Yet, for me, these selections always felt uncomfortable (in no small part because the Torah does not initially invite the skin-diseased over for a meal). *Tazria-Metzora* focus on an essential (though time limited) otherness of some Israelites with restrictions decided not by the stricken, but by the unaffiliated community.

For the last couple of years, however, the Saturday designated Shabbat Itanu has coincided with the reading of *parashat Kedoshim*. Rather than a message of division, *Kedoshim* speaks to our shared intrinsic holiness. Irrespective of ability, the *parashah* preaches, we are all chosen by God. For me, that is a more appropriate reading for Shabbat Itanu. Ideally, we would live in a world where Shabbat Itanu is not required. We should always be maximally inclusive/ accessible. It should simply be something that we always do, something that is integrated into all of our programming and services. But it is not. That's why we have Shabbat Itanu. It reminds us of an obligation that is otherwise overlooked, of a responsibility that is accepted without argument, but not always implemented without concerted effort.

As noted elsewhere in this *Bulletin*, I am proud to report that the Board of Governors recently accepted an Action Plan submitted by the Inclusion Task Force, providing 36 concrete steps that the Synagogue can take in the short, medium and long term to be more inclusive, particularly in the areas of visual accessibility, auditory accessibility and our Congregational School. I am pleased that the Congregation has already taken steps toward implementation.

The Mishna (Tamid 7:4) describes the messianic era as יום שכולו שבת, a day that is eternally Shabbat. In a perfect world, there would be no need for Sunday to Friday. We would exist perpetually in a perfect time. Our relationship with God and our fellow Jews would be at an eternal apex. In this world though, with all of its limitations, we need a specially designated day wherein we concentrate our efforts. Similarly, Shabbat Itanu exists, in its limited way, because we live with modern limitations. An ideal world would be one in which Shabbat Itanu is not needed. Until then, I look forward to marking it annually, as our community reminds itself of its obligation to all Jews.

# The Changing Face of Jewish Education Today

We believe that our learners need to feel a deep connection with their Judaism in order for the skills they learn to mean something important.

I WRITE THIS ARTICLE FOLLOWING MY

most favourite CSIX (Congregational School Experience) Sunday of the year—the Sunday before Pesah. Yesterday morning, the halls were filled with children's voices belting out *Ma Nishtanah* and *Dayeinu*, we had the inevitable grape juice spills, matzah crumbs were everywhere, and most importantly, our 80 students walked out of Beth Tzedec not only ready for Pesah, but proud of what they know and can share at their family Seders.

There is a constant dilemma in supplementary Jewish education, where instructional time is increasingly scarce, over what to teach and, more importantly, how to teach it. My colleagues and I all agree that key elements of Jewish literacy those components that allow an individual to feel part of the broader group—are very important, and include Hebrew, prayers, knowledge about Shabbat, holidays and *mitzvot*, a connection to Israel and so on.

The dilemma emerges in the instructional method. Some are proponents of knowledge transfer, where the teachers give or share what they know with their learners, aspiring for the learners to accept and internalize the subject matter. Others favour a more whole-child approach that relies on developing a relationship between the teacher and the learner so that knowledge is not transferred in a uni-directional line but instead explored, revealed, unpacked and internalized using more socio-emotional and experience-based techniques.

We all know deep down that the second method I describe is more likely to lead to a lifelong connection and commitment to Judaism and Jewish learning. We also know that the first method makes it easier to measure success and allows for a faster pace covering more material. So what's a school administrator to do? In short, try and take the best of both worlds, plotting the school somewhere along the continuum and owning the decision, making it clear why one value is prioritized over the other.

Here at the CSIX @ Beth Tzedec, we have opted for the more relational approach. We believe that our learners need to feel a deep connection with their Judaism in order for the skills they learn to mean something important. As an example, learning to read and speak Hebrew becomes all the more relevant when you can practice and show what you've learned in conversations with our *shinshinim*. Reciting and singing prayers are more impactful when they are framed as one of many—but not the only—way to connect to God.

And what about subjects or skills that just have to be taught and acquired? We make sure that they are learned in as relational an environment as possible. This coming school year we will be teaching Hebrew reading, writing and vocabulary to our Grade 3 to 7 students in groups of no more than four students (as opposed to our previous class sizes of eight to ten). This will help ensure that each child gets individualized attention from the teacher. It also will help build deeper and more meaningful relationships between each student and the teacher and among the group participants. This approach offers more flexibility for students and their families to select their preferred group meeting time.

Supplementary school is changing, and changing fast. With the increasing costs of Jewish day school, more Jewish families will be opting for our form of Jewish education. At CSIX, we are working to stay ahead of the curve, making sure that the learning and social environments we create bring out the best in our students, our teachers and our community. We use the limited time available to instill Jewish pride, generate Jewish inquiry and teach Jewish skills. Our continued growth and success is vital to the future of the Beth Tzedec and Toronto Jewish community, and dependent on the participation and support of member families and the community at large.

# Raising the *Ruah*; Building a Caring Community



TIME FLIES WHEN WE ARE HAVING FUN, AND EVEN MORE SO when we are engaged in important, though sometimes challenging, work. As I write this, it is hard to believe that I have already been part of the Beth Tzedec community for nine months! After having cleaned our homes of even the smallest of crumbs and as we wait impatiently for the blossoming of spring flowers, we are also planting the seeds for the future at Beth Tzedec by planning hundreds of programs and experiences offered by this incredible institution.

As we plan for the future, I want to highlight a few of the new initiatives that have been added to the Beth Tzedec docket that you may have missed, and may want to try next year or share with your family and friends.

Little Minyan Raise the *Rual*: Since December, we have selected one Shabbat morning each month in which we amp up the Little Minyan (LM) experience by encouraging dozens of people to lead a part of the service. The response has been wonderful as the regular attendance has doubled and the energy is electrified with high quality *davening* leaders, including recent *b'nai mitzvah* and people in their 20s and 30s who are new to our community. Stay tuned for future dates.

Impact Ethiopia—Giving Beyond the Jewish Community and the Jewish Service Network Trip to North Bay: In early May, 20 young adults travelled to Ethiopia and 12 high school students travelled to North Bay for leadership development, hands-on volunteering and cultural exchanges—putting *tikkun olam* in action. For Every Season: I had the privilege of learning Jewish texts and tackling challenging questions with a group of seniors mostly over the age of 80 and, between us, we often had more than 800 years of cumulative experience in the room! I am excited to be continuing this learning in the fall as well as offering new high-level learning opportunities for seniors.

Li'l Minyans: Every Shabbat morning, children ages 0-5 gather with their parents for Li'l Minyans, a fun and interactive *tefillah* service full of songs, stories and playbased learning. We are building our community one toddler at a time!

What these programs, and many others like them, have in common is that they do three substantial things:

- 1. They "raise the *rual*,"—energizing our lives and creating exciting opportunities for prayer and growth.
- 2. They empower us to increase our knowledge and learn in multiple and dynamic ways, with and from people of all ages.
- 3. They push us to acknowledge that we live in an imperfect world, and there is an imperative to continue to do all we can to incrementally change this reality.

I am looking forward to 5777 as we continue to work together in this *kehillah kedoshah* to fine tune our caring community that empowers more people to seek and offer help with dignity and love.

# Bringing History to Life

Curator Dorion Liebgott shares her experiences from the recent Council of American Jewish Museums Conference.



#### I RECENTLY ATTENDED THE ANNUAL COUNCIL OF AMERICAN

Jewish Museums Conference in New York. The conferences are held in different American cities every year, and once every three years in New York, as there are so many outstanding Jewish venues, museums and synagogues to visit.

The comprehensive and instructive nature of this conference has proven to be a valuable resource, affording me the opportunity to meet new curators and reconnect with longstanding colleagues working in the Jewish museum field.

This year's theme was *Next Narratives: The Stories We Tell*, and sessions explored the ideas and narratives of our institutions and imaginations. Balancing the conceptual, the strategic and the practical, *Next Narratives* considered how stories can be used to embrace diversity, engage new audiences and stakeholders, and inform the changing role of Jewish museums.

In one of the first sessions titled "Rebar with Reboot", three generations of talented storytellers reimagined their Bar/Bat Mitzvah and other rites of passage. Conference attendees contributed their own stories and reflections in the form of six-word memoirs, many of which were later shared with the group. Sessions included talking circles where attendees met with like-minded institutions for open and informal discussion on topics raised during the conference related to its theme. Another session dealt with religious expression of Judaism which is often absent from Jewish museum narratives. It explored how religious life and ideas might be recounted for traditional and non-traditional audiences. In some situations, museums are downplaying religion in favour of broad secular values.

Other sessions and plenaries included "Engaging the Digital Realm", demonstrating how digital storytelling is becoming more affordable and simpler to produce; "Mission Alignment: Jewish Museums and Jewish Philanthropy", exploring how museums are becoming sustainable repositories and interpreters of Jewish culture, and how they must demonstrate strategic value in terms that apply to various communities. Other seminars looked at successful collaborations and the cultivation of new partnerships within cultural communities.

One particular session proffered that story telling can be used to embrace evolving myriad Jewish identities, something we have undertaken in our own Beth Tzedec Reuben & Helene Dennis Museum. Our focus has been to share our stories through items in our collection as well as exhibitions of photography, art and other cultural items.

Attending this conference reinforced for me the myriad ways we can explore historical material and create new exhibitions to entice, educate and stimulate, and yet still be entertaining.

# Randy Spiegel to be Honoured by Congregation

#### THIS YEAR, RANDY SPIEGEL, OUR

Executive Director, was commissioned an *Amin Tzibur*, the highest designation for a synagogue professional, by the National Association of Synagogue Executives (NAASE). The *Amin Tzibur* requires a demonstration of Judaic knowledge, commitment to Israel, ritual competence and engagement with synagogue and communal life. In addition to study and education requirements, Randy was required to write a research paper. Development and Public Relations at Associated Hebrew Schools, and he held positions in the Endowment and Planning departments at UJA Federation. Randy earned his BA from what is now the Jewish University of America in Los Angeles and two MA degrees from Brandeis University.

# Rav Baruch to be Honoured by UJA Federation



#### ON THE EVENING OF JUNE 8, RABBI

Baruch Frydman-Kohl will receive the Gordy Wolfe Award for Jewish Communal Professional Leadership. This award, named in honour of Gordy Wolfe<sup>z</sup>", who served as Executive Director of Jewish Family & Child (JF&CS) for 22 years, recognizes a visionary professional communal leader who has made a substantive difference in the life of Jewish Toronto. Rav Baruch will be the first Toronto rabbi recognized in this way. Rav Baruch has always conceptualized his rabbinic service to Beth Tzedec as including leadership in the extended community. He has served on the Board of Directors of UJA Federation and Mazon, and was President of the Toronto Board of Rabbis and the Ontario Region of the Rabbinical Assembly, a member of the Committee on Jewish Law and Standards of the RA and Chair of its 2002 convention. Rav Baruch was one of the initiators of Sukkahville and has served as a rabbinic *madrikh*  (counsellor) on the March of the Living, a teacher at Camp Ramah, and a behind-the-scenes advisor to many community leaders and organizations. He is recognized as a leader in interfaith activities, having initiated the Path of Abraham, and currently serves as a delegate of our community to the Canadian Catholic-Jewish Consultation Dialogue. #### Hesed Report

#### Out of the Cold

The 16<sup>th</sup> season of Out of the Cold closed March 23. This volunteer initiative of Beth Tzedec and Beth Sholom offers safe refuge, hospitality and emergency shelter to the homeless in our community. Our site is one of the largest temporary shelters in the city, providing over 180 people with a hearty meal prepared by Toronto Kosher, overnight accommodation, breakfast, a bagged lunch and subway tokens.

This year, guests were entertained by outstanding musical entertainment. Some sang with the bands while others danced in the aisles. A special thank you to The Deloraines, Dave Borins, The Wild Walker Band and The Nursery (Jared Roth and Alex Pulec) who volunteered their time each week—to great applause!

The Art Circle, under the guidance of Melanie Samra, inspired many to produce beautifully creative pieces that were sold at our annual Art Show and Sale. The artists received a substantial percentage from the sale of their pieces, while the Out of the Cold program benefitted as well. The feeling of pride and accomplishment on the faces of the artists made it all worthwhile. This program would not have been as successful without the generosity of Jacklyn Rosenblat of Gwartzman's and Elgin Picture and Frame (Dupont Street), who ensured that our guests had art supplies and mounted all of the art work for the show. The needs of our guests are always forefront in our minds. Our on-site public health nurse monitored their health, and they all received essential warm winter clothing, boots and sundry items from our clothing bank, much of which was donated by Bass Pro-Shops Outdoor World, Roots Canada, Caulfield Apparel Group, Tribal Inc. and Joe Fresh. We even received boots from the Metropolitan Toronto Police Force drive for the homeless! As always, the gently-used clothing donations received from the community were appreciated.

A mindfulness course, courtesy of the Centre for Mindfulness Studies, was introduced this year and proved popular. It allowed the participants the opportunity to enhance their sense of relaxation and to learn coping skills.

Many dedicated companies and individuals have generously supported Out of the Cold, supplying duffle bags filled with socks, t-shirts, winter hats, waterproof gloves and sleeping bags, as well as bottled water, courtesy of |ody Steinhauer of the Bargains Group. Sylvia Galin and Maureen Bayer felt a need to help by hand-knitting beautiful scarves and gloves. Bialik Hebrew Day School's Grade 8 students conducted a token drive and donated 175 tokens and organized bingo games with gift cards for the winners. Hillel House and Moishe House undertook similar initiatives.

Beth Tzedec's Youth group, led by Lily Chapnik, helped serve dinner to the homeless on several occasions, and organized bingo games with prizes. The Bar/Bat Mitzvah program participants, led by Simmi Toby, baked delicious muffins.

Students have also become active supporters. Andrea Glube made fridge magnets that she sold to her friends and at two Purim Carnivals, using the proceeds to purchase winter jackets, jeans and boots, as well as a brand new toaster for our program. Natasha Aaron created beautiful hair bows that she sold at school and at Beth Sholom's Purim Carnival and Art Show. Some children chose to use creative centrepieces at their Bar/Bat Mitvahs filled with art supplies, food products or winter necessities, so that the products could be donated to OOTC.

The Out Of The Cold program is an enormous undertaking, one that could not be accomplished without our very dedicated team of volunteers. Over I50 people perform a host of functions every week. I would like to thank all who gave of their time and energy to help out in this most enriching *mitzvah*. I would also like to acknowledge the support of the Mosaic Lodge of the Masons and the wonderful office staff at Beth Tzedec and Beth Sholom.
