Darkness to Light, Fear to Faith, Scarcity to Abundance



Cultivating an abundance mentality opens us up to see different options and opportunities to acheive goals.

YEARS AGO, I HAD A POSTER TITLED "99 REASONS WHY IT Won't Work." Although I struggle against this tendency, reminding myself of the importance of venturing forward, I occasionally hear an idea and quickly think of a rebuttal, the reasons why it won't fly. Many of us do this as parents and friends, colleagues and co-workers, in synagogue and public life.

In mediation training, we are encouraged to think expansively about possibilities, helping negotiating parties to look beyond their initial limitations and prior positions to explore and expand opportunities. Rather than receive an idea with the words "Yes, but ..." (what one person termed a Canadian form of no), training in improvizational theatre teaches participants to respond "Yes, and ..." to a suggestion, creating a model of collaboration rather than criticism.

The Biblical scholar Walter Brueggemann observes, the Bible starts out with a liturgy of abundance ... a song of praise for God's generosity. It tells how well the world is ordered. It keeps saying, "It is good, it is good, it is good, it is very good." It declares that God blesses ... endows with vitality the plants and the animals and the fish and the birds and humankind. And it pictures the Creator as saying, "Be fruitful and multiply" ... the overflowing goodness that pours from God's creator spirit ... The creation ends on Sabbath. God is so overrun with fruitfulness that God says, "I've got to take a break from all this. I've got to get out of the office." Genesis affirms abundance and denies scarcity.

Later in Genesis, God directs Abraham, Sarah and their family to "go forth", telling them to become a blessing through which all nations will be blessed. Brueggemann: "Blessing is the force of well-being active in the world, and faith is the awareness that creation is the gift that keeps on giving."

Cultivating an abundance mentality opens us up to see different options and other opportunities to achieve our goals. Rather than the economic model of limited resources and possibilities, we can adopt a way of thinking and behaviour that enables us to carry on when facing scarcity and adversity. Meeting new partners, finding new work and discovering new prospects in life often depend on viewing situations with a different lens or a new perspective.

In the Torah, Pharaoh symbolizes the notion of economic scarcity. He dreams of famine and fearfully engages Joseph to administer, control and monopolize the supply of food. When crops fail, the peasants come to Joseph. Acting for Pharaoh, Joseph has them mortgage land for food. Next, they encumber their cattle. By the third year of famine, they can only offer themselves. Pharaoh eventually has all the land. Slavery and scarcity dominate Egyptian culture.

The book of *Shemot* (Exodus) describes the tension between the brutality of Egyptian society and the possibility of abundance flowing from national freedom and Divine love. After leaving Egypt, the gift of manna represents the *besed*-generosity of God. Nonetheless, even though there is a surfeit of manna, the people are limited by a fearful memory of scarcity. They try to hoard the manna: it can't be preserved and rots. God's gift can't be bottled; it has to be received as a fresh wonder each day. Eventually, Moses said, "Let's do what God did in Genesis. Let's not hustle all the time. Let's have Shabbat." And there was a double portion of manna.

Moshe leads the ever anxious people toward the Land of Promise, a place of plenty, "a land of wheat and barley, of vines and fig trees and pomegranates; a land of olive oil and honey; a land where you will eat food without scarcity, in which you will not lack anything; a land whose stones are iron, and out of whose hills you can dig copper. When you have eaten and are satisfied, you shall bless the Eternal your God for the good land given to you (Deuteronomy 8)." The Torah encourages a vision of amplitude, and our prayers will reinforce this with a liturgy of hope and *berakhot* celebrating abundance.

A perspective of abundance is encouraging of others.

Hear the suggestion or request and don't immediately negate it. Instead of saying "But," try "Yes, and." To the child's question, "Will you play a game with me?" the adult, busy with Sunday work emails can say, "Yes, and let's go pick it out together." Receive a co-worker's suggestion and help to develop it. See the greater scheme of things.

The mentality of abundance is one of perspective. Not everything works according to a pre-existing plan. There may be other options to achieve our life goals. Carry on, continue forward to meet new partners, find new employment opportunities and discover new prospects in life. Seeing situations from new angles can bring tangible solutions to our lives.

The mindset of abundance recognizes that we must live within our means and work with the very real limitations of our bodies. It also accepts risk and the possibility of failure. It embodies a realistic hope that a new opportunity will come along, that there is something to be learned from every situation, that we can try again and might eventually succeed.

This also has implications for our attitude toward *tzedakah*. A theology of abundance encourages us to be generous, appreciative of what we have and able to share with others. Perhaps this underlies the rabbinic teaching that even one who receives *tzedakah* has an obligation to also give to others. A mentality of abundance enhances personal dignity.

Russell Redenbaugh, who lost his sight in a science experiment at age 16, speaks about shifting the narrative, having the courage to be larger than our fears, and expanding the boundaries that we often impose on ourselves. Breuggemann explains that each of us has an inner Pharaoh that fears there is not enough. Yet the Torah narrative of abundance is an important message, teaching that the story of our lives is an "invitation to the wilderness where there is bread".

In the winter months, we sense the scarcity of sunlight. The summer sun is so ample, we must remind ourselves to prepare during good times for periods of challenge. Yet the cool pale light of winter is not permanent. Our prayers teach us to hope and invest our efforts to move "from darkness to a great light". By the time we reach the full moons of Tu B'Shevat, Purim and Pesah, we know that we have again turned to the abundance of light.

The Search Committee has reviewed many candidates, and the very best have been offered opportunities to appear as musical scholars, providing us with a special Shabbat experience and the opportunity to connect with them through program and prayer.

The rabbinic search continues, and will take some time to fill the nearly impossible position of the new Senior Rabbi, whose role and responsibilities will be shaped by our strategic goals and objectives.

Change is always difficult, but Beth Tzedec's strength is its ability to articulate a fresh vision and to formulate

plans that embrace change for the long-term benefit of our members. Leadership is looking at ways to change the way Beth Tzedec is governed and improve accountability, transparency and engagement. We are redrafting our constitution and by-laws to, bring them up-to-date and make them more functional.

Mark your calendar for our upcoming events, like our Shabbat Shirah Weekend, the weekly Games Afternoons, the Give Bubbie a Break Shabbat Dinner on January 27, Tot Shabbat is on February 24 and the Purim Carnival and Seudah that follows the Megillah reading on March 12.

Finally, as a destination for your *simhah*, you will want to enjoy our new Mezzanine Hall, a bright, airy and welcoming venue—a magnificent space in the heart of our community. Our newly updated main floor Banquet Hall is perfect for your larger events. Beth Tzedec Board Approves Strategic Plan Structure

THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS HAS APPROVED THE STRUCTURE of the shul's *Strategic Plan* (2017-2022), setting out six key elements of a strategy that will guide the synagogue over the next five years. The plan was developed from the Strategic Planning Committee's analysis of input from our membership, clergy, staff and outside community leaders. Last year's membership survey response was particularly helpful.

Our work was guided by two consultants from Management Advisory Service (MAS), Christine Govern and David Saffran. We greatly appreciated their assistance throughout the development of the plan. MAS has provided pro bono consulting services to more than 1,300 non-profit groups through its network of more than 60 former business executives and professionals. We are pleased that Christine Govern will continue to support the Board in the next phase of the planning process. The *Strategic Plan* will establish specific goals with key performance indicators to measure success, and it will be accompanied by an Operating Plan created with input from Beth Tzedec's *Klei Kodesh*, staff, committees, Executive and Board of Governors.

Once the full *Strategic Plan* has been considered and approved by the Board early in the new year, it will be posted on the Beth Tzedec website. If you have any questions or comments, please send an email to strategicplanning@beth-tzedec.org.

demands dedication and creativity by program and house staff. Beginning at the crack of dawn, we are called upon to set up, clean up and welcome groups of six to 600. From programs for the community that can attract 1,500 guests to our High Holy Days where we welcome over 6,000 people, we work on making every nook and cranny functional. When problems arise, as they invariably do, the Beth Tzedec team responds with solutions to keep everything running seamlessly.

Visit Beth Tzedec in the afternoon and witness 400 RHA staff and students heading out the door as a fresh group of youth and teens enter for evening programs and classes. Members come to pray in the Hendeles Chapel while others head to study in the Hurwich Board Room. You might join visitors attending a film in the Banquet Hall or peek in on a Bat Mitzvah child holding a dress rehearsal on the *bimah* in the Sanctuary. And, if you are in the mood, you can join one of the latenight basketball leagues that regularly meet in our Kimel Family Gym.

Life at BT is surrounded by and connected to the Jewish community, with our programs delivered within a framework of Jewish values and ethics. While we embrace diversity, we play by certain ground rules that help define us, and how we do what we do is critically important. For example, when we provide refreshments or meals to any group—Jewish or not—all food is kosher. While we do not have a dress code, we nonetheless respect the sanctity of the Synagogue and ask that those attending prayer services dress modestly. Our adult and community education programs and lectures, while sometimes a little "UnOrthodox", are topically Jewish and address cultural, political and spiritual issues of the day.

We are the "people of the Book" who learn and share our knowledge with and among each other and the broader community. Our teachings and laws, as well as the philosophical underpinnings of Judaism and Conservative Judaism, are reflected in how we do what we do. Every day, we make the day-to-day sacred. We transform an empty hall or classroom into a sacred prayer space by moving chairs and bringing in a portable Aron Kodesh and siddurim. Corridors reverberate with the music of prayer and celebration. Whether signing a *ketubah* or dancing with a groom or bride, we turn our attention inward and upwards, and our simhah spaces become sacred. Our Synagogue is a house of worship, a house of gathering, where people from all walks share their ideas, hopes and dreams. We congregate to connect, to engage with each other and to experience Jewish life. Your Beth Tzedec is a true community centre, where anyone of any age is welcome to learn, sing, pray and socialize.

When planning a lifecycle event or a family Shabbat dinner, do it in your second home. Celebrating and gathering at the Synagogue can be warm, comfortable and worry-free. Just as the doors of Abraham's tent were open to travellers and guests, our doors are open and we welcome you with open arms.

Reflections on Domestic Abuse

I have seen a world in which all but a few taboos have been washed away.

I AM TOO YOUNG TO HAVE ONLY

whispered the word cancer, but old enough to recall those who did. The hidden subjects of the past are now thankfully out in the open. I have seen a world in which all but a few taboos have been washed away.

Recently, Beth Tzedec hosted "Behind Closed Doors: Shattering the Myths about Domestic Violence in the Jewish Community", in which we brought the sunlight to one of the last of our community's unmentionables. As the recent murder of Toronto physician Elana Fric-Shamji and the arrest of her neuro-surgeon husband all too clearly and sadly demonstrate, domestic violence occurs in all familytypes and income levels.

Following a powerful video and introduction from Penny Krowitz, Executive Director of Act to End Violence Against Women, the 80 attendees heard from me, psychologist Dr. Barbara Landau and Marilyn Snider, a survivor of domestic violence. The panel was carefully moderated by human rights consultant Dr. Karen Mock.

As I noted at the program's opening, the purpose of the event was not to explore a morally complicated issue, as is often the thrust of Beth Tzedec programs. There is no deep moral question or ambiguity about the acceptability of domestic violence. Though we must acknowledge that some early Jewish sources do permit a husband to batter his wife, such violence (physical or otherwise) is without a doubt absolutely forbidden today. Rather, the program was meant to empower abused individuals (and, to a lesser degree, abusers) to seek the help that they need and to educate and train community members to be advocates.

Basing himself on a *midrash*, Rashi, reflecting on Abraham's journey with Sarai to the Land of Israel, teaches that travel causes three things. It inhibits the birth of children, decreases one's wealth and lessens one's fame. Those three concerns exist as well for one who attempts to move away from an abusive relationship. Anxieties about children, money and reputation (and other concerns) drive individuals to stay with violent partners. One of the purposes of the evening, and subsequent conversations, was to name and thereby resolve these impediments while providing an alternative vision for a better vision.

Certainly, change is difficult. This is true even when current reality is bad. The Jewish community—including Beth Tzedec—is ready and able to support individuals in their break from abusive partners. Indeed, it is our sacred duty.

A Jewish Place for Teens

If our goals are to instil Jewish pride and knowledge in our teens and to ensure a healthy and positive Jewish future, we need to increase the percentage of Jewish teens engaging in Jewish experiences with their peers.

Jewish child's entrance into the adult Jewish community. While our tradition is clear that one becomes a Jewish adult the morning of your 12th (for girls) or 13th (for boys) Hebrew birthday, we have come to associate a Bar or Bat Mitzvah with the public ceremony marking this moment, usually consisting of an aliyah to the Torah, and often including the Bar or Bat Mitzvah child reading Torah and/or chanting a haftarah and/or leading part of the service and/or teaching the community in some way. The preparatory work for this public ceremony is intense, and the moment is often considered, regrettably in my opinion, the end goal of a child's Jewish education.

I believe that this paradigm is flawed and near broken. Families today are looking for meaning, relevance and personalization, not ceremonies in unfamiliar settings. Synagogues are trying to figure out how to balance the needs of regular prayer attendees and the particular requests of families wishing to celebrate a simbah, all in an environment of lower birthrates, lower affiliation rates and more options beyond the walls of the synagogue. The B'nei mitzvah factories of the past two generations are like so many other factories these days; dwindling in output as innovations have disrupted the traditional business models. To combat this, Jewish educators are trying to send the message that Jewish education-especially synagoguebased supplementary programs—is not a means to an end, the end being Bar/Bat Mitzvah; rather, elementary-level learning is the first part of a lifelong connection to Jewish study.

It has been almost ten years since Beth Tzedec offered a high school level Jewish educational program. We have always run our teen youth programming, now back under USY, and introduced our Jewish Service Network teen learning trips, but for teens in our community looking to explore Jewish themes and topics in a more structured way, there has been a gap that we are now addressing.

JTEM (Jewish Teen Experience Midtown) is an engaging and forward-thinking partnership with Holy Blossom Temple and Beth Sholom Synagogue, where teens in Grades 8 to 12 come together on Monday nights to explore subjects like 3D modeling and printing of Jewish objects, Jewish theatre, Israeli film and television, Jewish art, Israeli politics and Judaism and the law. In addition to the learning, participants have a chance to meet and socialize with teens from other synagogues and the community, participate in service learning experiences on local, national and international levels and continue to build upon the learning they have acquired either in supplementary school or in Jewish day school.

Merely having a Bar or Bat Mitzvah is no guarantee of adult Jewish engagement. As noted Jewish demographers Jack Wertheimer and Steven Cohen wrote in 2014, "rather than letting its teens fend for themselves after bar and bat mitzvah, a serious Jewish community would seek to embrace and excite them".¹ This is what we are doing with JTEM and all our teen programming. There are almost 250 teens in Grades 8 to 12 in our Beth Tzedec community. Only 100 of them are currently participating in Jewish day or supplementary schools, just 40 percent of the total. (For comparison's sake, our JK to Grade 7 participation ratio in Jewish day or supplementary school is 77 percent.)

We know that not every teen is interested in exploring their Jewish identity, but we still have to try. We know that not everyone is available on Monday nights, but many are. So please, speak with your children and grandchildren about JTEM. Visit our website, www.jtemidtown.com, to learn more about the experiences we will be offering in our second (January to March break) and third (late March to May) terms. Call me for more information.

After a full year of planning and waiting impatiently, we were thrilled to welcome Hanaa, Tarek, Sana, Siba and Besan Alhamwi in September, just in time for the High Holy Days.

As I am constantly thinking about how we as a powerful and caring community can effect considerable change for Jewish people and the world, I am inspired by what we have been able to accomplish. I invite you to share with me where you would like our *hesed* and social justice efforts to be directed this year, and the ways in which you would like to help.

I also wanted to share notes I received from members of the working group and our sponsored family:

Message from Bari Zittell, co-chair of the BT Sponsorship Working Group

On a warm September evening, I was in Terminal 2 at Pearson with other members of the Syrian Refugee Family Working Group, Rav Cutler and Rav Frydman-Kohl. We were waiting to finally meet our sponsored family. After months of preparation, anticipation and concerns for their safety, mom and dad (Hanaa and Tareq), with daughters Sana, Siba and Besan were finally moments away from coming through the door into their new lives. With us was our anchor family, Thanaa and Amyn Sarif. Thanaa had not seen her sister since 2011, before the war in Syria started. After a two hour wait, our family exited the immigration office. We waved our Canadian flags, held aloft our welcome signs, watched with tears in our eves as Thanaa and her sister Hanaa embraced. The family was understandably exhausted. Their day had begun with a several hour bus ride to the Istanbul airport. But now they were here, safe at last with us, their new extended Canadian family.

The Alhamwis are settled in their apartment. Parents and kids are in school. They are learning to navigate life in Toronto. They loved the first snow fall, although their enthusiasm for winter may fade in a couple of months! Where do we fit into their lives? We will be responsible for their financial security until next September, we will help them with various tasks and appointments, help the adults secure jobs when their English improves. Things will come up unexpectedly. This week they encountered their first credit card scam, a phone call we hadn't thought to prepare them for. Each month, they will become more confident, feel safer, less fearful and learn to handle situations independently. And we will feel more comfortable letting them make their own way. I see myself always being in their lives on some level and them in mine. Sometimes we do get choose family, and we got to



choose the Alhamwis. May we all go from strength to strength.

Message from the Alhamwi family Dearest friends at Beth Tzedec:

A heartfelt greeting to all of you. Since our arrival to Canada, our lives have changed dramatically for the better.

Your wonderful and warm welcome has given us the hope and ability to start a new, safe life in Canada in spite of the horrible circumstances we've been through. In addition, the love, generosity and help you have extended to us in setting up our beautiful home has helped us feel a kind of stability and comfort that we haven't experienced in years.

We are all so happy and eager to learn English and become valuable members of our new home, Canada.

Hearing the Canadian national anthem every day at school makes us so happy. We feel like this is our home and we are truly Canadians because home is where you feel happy, safe and accepted. We will forever be proud Canadians!

We want to thank the entire Beth Tzedec group for your wonderful and unconditional help—we will never forget!

Message from Edna Hussman and her daughter Dori

I joined Beth Tzedec's Syrian Refugee Sponsorship Group because I saw it as an opportunity to get involved in something I felt strongly about, and through which I could make a tangible impact. I didn't expect my daughter to become involved. But when I discovered that the youngest girl in the family we are sponsoring, eight-year-old Besan, was just a little younger than my daughter Dori, I asked Dori if she would like to correspond with Besan while the family was still in Turkey awaiting their papers for Canada. Though the girls' correspondence was sporadic, I believe it was encouraging for Besan and her family, and for all of us here, as the wait for the family's arrival grew longer. Now that the family is here, Dori enjoys playing with Besan and wants to help her learn English.

For Dori, this has been an important lesson in empathy and the importance of helping others in need. She has also made a new friend. We have all made new friends.

Here is what Dori has to say about the experience

When my mom became part of the BT Syrian Refugee Sponsorship Group, she suggested I write letters to Hanaa's family so they wouldn't be shy with us when they came to Canada. So I wrote lots of letters and Besan wrote back. We wrote about how we were excited to meet! Then when the day came for Besan's family to fly to Canada, my mom, I and other committee

members all went to the airport.

We waited a LONG time and finally Besan and I got to meet! We were first very shy. It was hard to communicate, we wanted to say so much but couldn't. But we still could communicate with gestures, and now we can say some stuff to each other.

Now we've played basketball and *Monopoly Junior*, jumped in leaves, played at the playground, gone for walks and even just did random stuff with Besan's cousins.

I'm so happy Thanaa's sisters' families have come to Canada. It's kind of hard to leave your stuff behind and move to a new country. If you have friends and nice conversations, it makes it easier to call Canada home. I hope to bring Besan and her sisters and cousins tobogganing, sledding and snowman-making.

An Inclusive Community

With 'family' and 'unity' as key Beth Tzedec values, our Congregation was determined to provide the community with access to meaningful, inclusive service options.

THE HIGH HOLY DAYS ARE A TIME OF RENEWAL, REFLECTION

and intention. It is a time for families and friends to come together. A time when our Synagogue is full of life, full of many opportunities for prayer and reflection as we start the new year. For individuals with special needs, and their families, the High Holy Days can be challenging. Few opportunities are available that provide inclusive service and prayer options. With 'family' and 'unity' as key Beth Tzedec values, our Congregation was determined to provide the community with access to meaningful, inclusive service options as we began the new year.

This year, 2016 / 5777, marked an important milestone for Beth Tzedec Congregation. In January 2015, Beth Tzedec applied for and was accepted into the first cohort of the USCJ Ruderman Inclusion Action Community, with the goal of making our communities more inclusive and accessible for individuals with disabilities. Over the course of the past 18 months, the shul has gone to great lengths to ensure further auditory, visual, physical and emotional accessibility within our Synagogue.

Accessibility was a major consideration in our renovation plans: Braille versions of prayer books are available and staff are being trained to ensure inclusivity within our Congregation. The High Holy Days provided us with a meaningful platform to ensure that all of our congregants could access a meaningful service with their families. Under the leadership of Lindsey Malc and myself (both trained educators), the *Kehillah Inclusion Service* offered a hands-on holiday service for individuals with special needs and their families. The *Kehillah Inclusion Service* was held on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, and focused on key prayers and rituals with the goal of uniting families through a shared Jewish experience.

Four individuals with special needs and their families joined our service, with a total of 20 people participating. As trained educators, the *Kehillah Inclusion Service* was incredibly meaningful to Lindsey and myself. We are very familiar with adapting programs to meet the needs of a wide variety of individuals. Lindsey and I first met when we worked at Zareinu Educational Centre, where Lindsey still works as Senior Behaviour Therapist. For the *Kehillah Inclusion Service*, we created an adapted *mahzor*. We brought in materials that touched all senses (plush toys, holiday food, a craft project). In addition to the service, we focused on adding Jewish value to the experience. For example, *besed* was a key component. On the first day of Rosh Hashanah, we talked about giving thanks to those who are important to us. We made granola and packaged it as a thank you gift to our Rosh Hashanah meal hosts. On the second day of Rosh Hashanah, the shofar was brought to the service. Our guest shofar blower carefully played through each set of sounds, allowing for our guests to follow along on their toy *shofarim*. We witnessed families unite through Jewish ritual and individuals connect with the holiday practices in a new way.

While the inaugural *Kehillah Inclusion Service* was small, it provided value and impact far beyond our expectations. In the psalm *Hinei Ma'tov*, we learn, "Behold how good and pleasant it is when all people live together as one." Beth Tzedec's *Kehillah Inclusion Service* provided just that—an opportunity for our whole community to be together as one.

Regardless of ability, experience or knowledge, this service focused on access. We ensured that the language, prayers and value were accessible, and the results were outstanding. We witnessed a sister and her sibling with special needs join together in song. A father and his young son with special needs studied the story of Jonah and the whale. We witnessed a ten-year-old member have her first shul volunteer experiences guiding our guests through the shofar blowing. All members were welcome, and all members felt welcome.

The *Kehillah Inclusion Service* marks the first of a series of inclusive programs at Beth Tzedec. Plans for Tu B'Shevat, Passover and Purim are under way. As our Synagogue continues to ensure that our infrastructure is inclusive, we remain committed to also ensuring that our programming and experiences are open and accessible to all of our community members.

Through a Visitor's Eyes

Yizhar Hess, executive director of The Masorti Movement in Israel, visited Beth Tzedec as a guest lecturer on November 18 and 19. He shared his impressions of Shabbat at Beth Tzedec.

THE FIRST THING THAT CAUGHT MY EYE UPON ENTERING

Beth Tzedec Congregation was a poster on a bulletin board showing a large group of men and women standing on a staircase. Two of them were holding the sign saying "YES". The caption, a call for organ donation, explained that this noble deed is actually a commandment, and the people pictured were the rabbis of the Toronto Board of Rabbis— Conservative, Reform and Orthodox, men and women—who understand the importance of this mitzvah. As a kidney transplant recipient myself (forced to migrate to Latvia to have the transplant performed), I couldn't help but be excited by this message.

Beth Tzedec is one of three of the biggest congregations in the Conservative movement. There are several worship spaces, and the largest of them isn't just large, it's HUGE. There are at least three prayer services offered every Shabbat: the Sanctuary Service, led by a rabbi and cantor; a Little Minyan Service, led by the participants taking roles leading prayer, reading Torah and serving as gabbai; and even an Orthodox service that found a welcoming home in this Conservative shul. Interesting!

What is the most difficult task in leading a community that is so big, I asked Rabbi Baruch Frydman-Kohl, the senior rabbi. He smiled. In fluent Hebrew, he explained that you couldn't succeed in this role if you don't enjoy working with all the many different groups within this large Congregation. It's like a big factory or a large hospital. There are almost no days without a birth, funeral or event requiring rabbinic involvement. But if a large congregation cannot provide the feeling of a small community, then it is not focussing enough on being a 'community'.

I saw how he accomplished this. During prayers, Rav Baruch was not on the *bimah*. He moved between the rows, touching people on the shoulder, shaking hands, hugging. There was no one that he didn't welcome.

In my visit, I learned that all of Israel's Prime Ministers have visited Beth Tzedec, with the exception of Ehud Barak. One of the Congregation's members is worldrenowned photographer Al Gilbert who has photographed all the visiting Prime Ministers—all of them, from Ben Gurion to Bibi. The portraits, obviously treasured, are each signed by Gilbert and hung in a main hallway for all to appreciate.

The most impressive picture, though, is not a portrait. It is a photograph of David Ben Gurion addressing the full Congregation. Gilbert snuck up behind him—click, click capturing a great moment in time. A little man with a white mane centered around a black kippah, wrinkled, standing in front of 4,000 people talking Zionism.

On that visit, Ben Gurion insisted on speaking to youth, Rav Baruch informed me, about the battle for the heritage of the Jewish community and Zionism. He summoned them, long story short, in the typical Ben Gurion manner, to go on aliyah. "Already tomorrow." "Your place is there. Not here." And Ben Gurion's message was received with love.

Indeed, Beth Tzedec is truly Zionist without apology. The floor of the main lobby displays an exact replica of the mosaic floor of the synagogue in Bet Alpha. Spectacular! Two years were dedicated to accurately installing this cosmic clockwork. Why? Because they are dedicated to educating that Israel should be in one's heart and in front of their eyes. Always.

Out of the Cold 2017

Registration is now open for the 18th season of Out of the Cold. This jointly run program operates Tuesday nights from January 3 to March 2I out of Beth Sholom's premises. To register as a volunteer, visit www.beth-tzedec.org/page/getting-involved.

Out of the Cold serves dinner for approximately 200 guests each week and provides sleeping accommodations and breakfast for 55 people. We are always looking for new volunteers to join our team. Shifts are approximately two hours, and volunteers can sign up for the dinner set-up, dinner service, distribution of warm clothing/art program, overnight shifts and breakfast preparation on Wednesday morning.

This program is an excellent Bar/Bat Mitzvah project, and community service hours are provided to high school students. It is also a wonderful opportunity to participate in *tzedakah*.

Out of the Cold is completely self-funded, relying on the community at large and corporate contributions. We are always in need of new or gently used **adult** clothing, especially down coats and ski jackets, winter boots, running shoes, sweatpants and sweatshirts, t-shirts and jeans. Hotel-size toiletries are also welcome. Items should be bagged, labelled and dropped off at Beth Sholom weekdays from 9:00 AM to 4:00 PM.

Our most pressing current need is for underwear, large tins of coffee, paper products (plates, bowls, cups, plastic cutlery) and industrial-sized garbage bags. All such large donations will be eligible for a tax receipt for the value of the goods.

Every Tuesday evening after dinner is served, our artists who form the Art Circle work on their paintings under the guidance of our accomplished instructors. Their creative pieces will be showcased at our annual art exhibit and sale *Basking in their Light: Breaking Stereotypes about the Homeless.* It will be held on Sunday, April 2 from 1:00 to 4:00 PM at Beth Sholom.
