

### Everything's Coming Up Aces



### Words and Deeds

ON A MID-AUGUST SHABBAT MORNING, ALAN ZIMMERMAN

stood outside his synagogue in Charlottesville, Virginia with an armed guard. Forty worshippers were inside. "Three men dressed in fatigues and armed with semi-automatic rifles stood across the street. Parades of Nazis passed our building, shouting, 'There's the synagogue!' followed by chants of 'Seig Heil' and other anti-Semitic language. Some carried flags with swastikas and other Nazi symbols. Nazi websites had posted a call to burn our synagogue, [so we took] the precautionary step of removing our Torahs, including a Holocaust scroll, from the premises. ... This is 2017 in the United States of America."

The "Unite the Right" rally brought together young men radicalized through the internet with groups such as Vanguard America ("An endless tide of incompatible foreigners floods this nation"), the Ku Klux Klan, Identity Europa (immigrants should "re-migrate" out of the United States), the League of the South ("Southern white culture is distinct from, and in opposition to, the corrupt mainstream American culture"); and the National Socialist Movement (deport Jews and "non-whites"). They carried Nazi and Confederate flags, gave Nazi salutes, shouted "blood and soil", "Jews will not replace us!" and "N\*\*\*\*\*r" at passers-by.

The controversy seemed to be about the statue of Confederate General Robert E. Lee. The statue was erected in the 1920s, during a period when America was excluding immigrants, lynching blacks and when income disparity was increasing. The contemporary controversy over the statue triggered overt expressions of anti-Semitism because the organizers of the rally share four intersectional beliefs. They believe the "white race" is in danger; the United States was built by and for white people; minorities are taking over the country; and America should be "free from the influence of international corporations, led by a rootless group of international Jews, which place profit beyond the interests of our people, or any people".

Growing up in Chicago, I was aware that members of my family had been killed during the Holocaust, and occasionally I experienced anti-Semitic bullying. As an adult, I protested against Soviet anti-Semitism, but generally felt that such expressions of hatred were either in the past or "over there". But more recent attacks on synagogues and community centres in North America, killings in schools and markets in France, have profoundly shaken me.

Witnessing the public display of Jew hatred by nationalist white supremacists, as well as the transformation of left-wing anti-colonialism into anti-Zionism and anti-Semitism, have left me—and many other Jews—anxious and angry. More than 70 years after the Holocaust, it is as if a large rock in the garden was moved and all the creepy-crawlies have emerged from beneath the stone. Jews are still the religious group most targeted in both Canada and the United States.

Haters have always been part of the American political landscape. But over the past century, a gradual effort succeeded in isolating them from civic life. William Buckley Jr., who conceptualized the ideological framework for conservative ideology in the second half of the 20<sup>th</sup> century, rejected his father's anti-Semitism and the extremism of the John Birch Society. He exiled Jew haters from the movement he sought to develop. He understood that when white nativists and anti-Semites have a place in the sun, they become dangerous.

Marshall Berman chose a phrase from Marx and Engels for the title of his book about the changes wrought by modern technology and commerce: "All that is solid melts into air". The dislocations initially described in the 19<sup>th</sup> century led to totalitarian regimes in the 20<sup>th</sup> century, Holocaust and Gulag, and two world wars.

In our century, we are experiencing the "future shock" foreseen by Alvin Toffler, when individuals and groups perceive "too much change in too short a period of time". Cultural and identity boundaries once imagined as fixed are now more fluid. Historical discourse and interpretations once accepted as given are in flux. Changing demographics and technological disruption have left many people with what David Brooks describes as "a bewildering freedom, without institutions to trust, unattached to compelling religions and sources of meaning, uncertain about their own lives, with an unnamable dread about the future". Rather than the Age of Aquarius, we have entered the Age of Anxiety.

During the recent American election campaign, Donald J. Trump fed the fear of an anxious nation. His election gave haters a place in the sun with permission to enter the public square. This summer, he minimized the actions of those who set the table for conflict by establishing a false equivalency between white supremacists and those who came to protest their hate. Even if some disruption also

came from counter-protesters such as Antifa, they did not initiate the rally. They did not shout or display Nazi salutes. They did not march under Nazi and Confederate flags.

What can we do? How should we face the violent words and deeds? Two rabbis who survived the Holocaust offer suggestions on ways forward.

First, stand with dignity and self-respect. For almost 25 years at Beth Tzedec, we have read an adaptation of a prayer composed by the late Rabbi Leo Baeck to introduce our Kol Nidrei service. He wrote these words in 1935, to be read aloud in German synagogues on the sacred night of Yom Kippur. The Nazi regime prohibited its distribution and arrested Rabbi Baeck, yet his words still resonate:

We express our abhorrence of the slander of our faith and its expressions. We believe in our faith and our future. Who brought the world respect for the Human made in the image of God? Who brought the world the commandment of justice, of social thought? It sprang from our prophets, and continues to grow in our Judaism. Our history is the history of spiritual greatness, spiritual dignity. We turn to it when attack and insult are directed against us, when need and suffering press in upon us.

Blacks and Jews, First Nations and Muslim immigrants have rich spiritual histories and should bring their legacies to Canadian life with pride.

Second, demonstrate moral principle. In 1963, responding to an invitation from President Kennedy to discuss religion and race, my teacher Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel sent a telegram to him:

Please demand of religious leaders personal involvement, not just solemn declaration. We forfeit the right to worship God as long as we continue to humiliate Negroes. ... The hour calls for moral grandeur and spiritual audacity.

Leaders must model righteous action.

Local and national leaders can be a counter-choir to the solo of President Trump. It was heartening to hear presidents George H.W. and George W. Bush unequivocally state, "America must always reject racial bigotry, anti-Semitism, and hatred in all forms". Senators and representatives, governors and mayors, business leaders and creative figures expressed sentiments similar to those written in 1790 by George Washington, that the Government of the United States "gives to bigotry no sanction, to persecution no assistance". In the face of those who would exclude from Canadian life, it was reassuring to hear premiers and parliamentarians articulate the importance of inclusion.

Third, when leaders do speak up for an inclusive Canada or America, let them know of your support. Stand with them. As the late Fred Rogers once said, "Be among the healers" not the haters. Encourage the best of us.

I learned to respond to anti-Semitism and racism with strong and dignified speech. I learned to respond to racism with personal engagement and forceful action. I learned to respond to hatred with faith, not fear, to gradually forge a more respectful and inclusive society. In the 21st century, we must continue to teach our children "when they sit in their homes and go on their ways, when they lie down and when they rise up" to love God and to respect those created in the divine image. Then our words and deeds will prevail.

At this time of anxiety, on the cusp of the New Year, Josette and I hope that 5778 will bring you the blessings of good health, much love and the moral commitment to walk toward peace.

Over the summer, we completed the repaving and realignment of the upper and lower parking lots, creating much-needed additional spaces. We also finished the expansion, renovation and centralization of the administrative and accounting departments, now located in the former library space. We are looking forward to revamping the second-floor accounting space to create a dedicated youth lounge for our teen members.







### Mizinke: Sweep 'em Away?

I think of how the rituals of our religion have given all of us a colourful framework around which we live our lives.



#### THIS PAST MONTH, I HAD THE DISTINCT HONOUR OF

walking my fourth and youngest child down the aisle to the wedding canopy. There is so much of this that makes me emotional, not the least of which is living to see this day—shehechiyanu vikiyamanu vehigiyanu lazman hazeh. I think often of friends who were like family, who have left this world and did not have the honour—or their children did not have the brakhah—of walking together from one life to another. I am also blessed to have terrific relationships with my children, their spouses and their children (my grandchildren). It is not always easy for them to accept me as I am, but they are respectful. As they have grown, their connection to Judaism and the synagogue has helped forge a foundation of respect and acceptance of all people. They are still, as we all are, growing into themselves and finding their way. That way, fortunately, includes respecting their parents.

So it was with interest that, as we approached the wedding, so many people asked me if this was my "Mizinke". Well, Koby is our final child to be married and we had seen the Mizinke done before. But what were the song, the brooms, the wreaths and the dancing all about? And did we want to do it? Initially, I had expected that this was an earned rite of passage, something that I had seen "old parents" get to do. As the time loomed closer, knowing people who don't have their children married off, or have had challenging life experiences, we wondered if this might be a bit of an 'in your face' ritual.

I found a very interesting article, "Exploring One of the Most Puzzling Rituals at a Jewish Wedding", by Reuven Becker, that gave me all of the background I needed (www.ou.org/jewish action/06/2014/mizinkedance-tradition-folklore/). In addition, I had recently studied with Rabbi Burton Visotzky at JTS and learned that there are tons of our traditions that have connections borrowed from other religions and cultures. The wreath/ laurel on the head during a *Mizinke* has a connection to the ancient Greeks, and while it does not have the same meaning, it was a fascinating reminder of our cultural development as a people. Known as the "broom dance", the Mizinke song which accompanies it is very much a song of gratitude for the blessings of God, of being able to raise and marry off children, sending them on their way, into their future lives. While the song refers to the

youngest daughter and presumes that children all marry in order, nonetheless, we interpret this to be representative of the last child to be married.

But what about the broom? Here I was troubled. The cute imagery is of the parents finally sweeping away their responsibilities, of cleaning house, of graduating to a next liberating period of life. Here the custom and my reality collide; first, I really, really like my kids. I like them around, I like when they laugh at or sometimes with me. While I wish that they were all totally independent, just as my parents I am sure wished the same about me, the broom has not swept them from my life, nor from the occasional opportunity to help out. If anything, I would like to vacuum them up and hold them as close as they will let me!

Yes, it's true, I wish that they would have moved their stuff out when they left. Still, having some of their memories occupy our shelves or closets gives me a lift—when it doesn't need dusting. I know I also still have "stuff" at my parents' house that they wished would have departed with me, too. The stuff we collect occupies too much of our space, and while it does not equal a person or often have a monetary value, seeing, holding and smelling something from another person and time does give us pause to think about the one who owned/placed it where we find it. I don't want it all swept away.

This momentous life cycle event of marriage, the joining of two lives, is steeped in ritual and holiness. It is a time of joy and celebration. It's a time when we can reflect and recall the little lives that came before, all who helped them grow to become their own people. It is a time to appreciate the blessings of life, of opportunity and of each other. The moments pass so fast, it seems, and must not be swept away. As I am in the Synagogue on Shabbat mornings I often think of "the little one I carried" and how true it is that "swiftly go the years". I think of taking my child to "Junior Congregation", of praying together, of making a *brakhah* or of gleefully sharing a cracker with herring (to my wife's disgust). I think of how the rituals of our

religion have given all of us a colourful framework around which we live our lives.

So yes, sing, dance and even wear costumes, but lose the broom.



### Thoughts on Camping

As lews, we are not meant to live in seclusion. We are, however, encouraged to take the time necessary to reflect upon the footprints we hope to leave behind.



### ONE OF MY GREATEST PLEASURES IN LIFE is camping.

There are two elements of a camping trip that I reflect upon quite a bit. First is that one is supposed to leave the forest the way she finds it. Were anyone to follow your route and be just one day behind, that person should not be able to tell that you were just there. Second is that after several arduous days of paddling and portaging, after a 100 kilometre journey often through pounding rain, scorching sun and ravenous insects, you finish exactly where you begin. This we call a success.

Before embarking on a voyage, our tradition teaches, in a source dating back to the Talmud (B. Brahot 29b), that one should recite a

Wayfarer's Prayer – תפילת הדרך, which can be found in most siddurim.

*Tfillat HaDerekh* has us pray "ותצעידנו לשלום, "emplace our footsteps toward peace". Though the prayer speaks of a destination, it focuses primarily on the journey. It focuses on the importance (and the potential peril) of each footstep. For it's the footstep—the increments, the day-to-day small gestures—together with the grand movements, that make up life.

Life of course is not a camping trip, for in life we are meant to leave our mark. Even if in some sense our lives may come full circle, the world itself continues on its journey. The Wayfarer's Prayer reminds us that we must each consider the mark that our footsteps will leave behind and how we can assure their permanence.

This year we mark the bicentennial of David Henry Thoreau, the great transcendentalist who spent a year living amidst nature and writing his most famous work Walden, in which he states "I went to the woods because I wished to live deliberately, to front only the essential facts of life, and see if I could not learn what it had to teach, and not, when I came to die, discover that I had not lived."

As Jews, we are not meant to live in seclusion. We are, however, encouraged to take the time necessary—whether while out in nature or amidst the comforts of modern civilization—to reflect upon the footprints we hope to leave behind.

### What's in a Name

Choosing names for a child is one of the most daunting things a parent experiences. There are so many things to consider.



#### CHOOSING NAMES FOR A CHILD IS ONE OF THE MOST

daunting things a parent experiences. There are so many things to consider. What names do I like? Who might I want to honour or commemorate? Do the initials spell anything meaningful, or more troublingly, inappropriate? Will the child like the name, in the near term and long term? It's a lot of pressure.

Rachel and I experienced all these emotions and questions as we decided on our son's name: Nadav Motek in English, and Nadav Hen Mordechai in Hebrew. We named him for two of our grandparents and a great uncle, and also tried to connect the attributes behind the names to values and principles that we hope he lives by. It was in some ways an easy process, but we still had moments of doubt along the way, wanting to make sure that we were happy with our choice.

Rosh Hashanah is a holiday with many names—I've counted five—and each name highlights a different aspect of the holiday. Rosh Hashanah (meaning Head of the Year) references the changeover of the annual calendar, this year moving into 5778. Yom Harat Olam (meaning Day the World is Born) connects the holiday to the days of Creation, reminding us of God's creative and restorative power. Yom Teruah (meaning Day of Blasts) connects to the sounding of the shofar and its call for introspection. Yom HaDin (meaning Day of Judgement) brings to mind the theme of God's judgement and God's determination for our year to come. Finally, Yom Hazikaron (meaning Day of Remembering) elevates the theme of God recalling promises to stand by, protect and secure the Jewish people, resulting in positive judgements for all of us.

Why so many names? Our sages give many explanations about each one, but to me, the beauty of multiple names for the holiday is that it allows for multiple, or alternate, points of connection. Perhaps one person is greatly moved by the idea of standing before God in judgement, while another connects to the sound of the shofar and its call to

attention. Some may find more than one name relatable, while others may only find meaning in one. The more names, the more entry-points for each individual, and hopefully, every single person can find a connection point with at least one of them.

I view Beth Tzedec's High Holy Day services and programs in the same way. There are six services and seven programs for each and every age and stage, each day of Rosh Hashanah. There are even more on Yom Kippur. Our commitment is to make sure that every person who enters the doors of 1700 Bathurst has a meaningful and connective experience by the time they leave. Of course, each person's journey will be unique. Some may have multiple experiences that create meaning, while others may only have one. Some may seek a variety of services and programs, and others may choose to dive more deeply into a single experience. Some may connect through music, others through learning, others through breathing and meditating, others through seeing friends and family. The possibilities seem almost endless.

When you and your family join us for Rosh Hashanah, please explore all the spaces, services and programs we offer. Make sure that your time with us at Beth Tzedec is meaningful for you. This might happen organically or spontaneously, but you may also have to work at it a bit, trying one thing and seeing if it works for you, and being prepared to move on if it doesn't. Then come back that next day and try something different or return to the thing you found and loved. Let these days be moments for spiritual and human connection, for growth and energy, for participating and soaking it all in. I look forward to bumping into you all over our building.

Rachel, Mira, Nadav and myself wish you all a *Shanah Tovah U'metukah*, a sweet, healthy and happy new year. May it be a year with more love and less hate, more peace and less violence, more understanding and less division.

### Don't Just Do Something, Stand There!



Simply hearing the plight of another person, affirming the experience and feelings being shared with us and being a witness to their suffering is incredibly difficult, but is also an amazing gift we can offer.

#### THE SHEMA IS ARGUABLY THE MOST

important, if not best known, Jewish phrase. Many Jews uttered these very words with their final breath, as Rabbi Akiva modeled. Conjuring for us ideas of Jewish commitment to God, mitzvot and our fellow Jews, the emphasis of the Shema on listening. "Hear, O Israel: the Eternal our God, the Eternal is one" (Devarim 6:4).

In our weekly "Li'l Minyans" service for kids up to age 5, we accentuate the element of hearing and listening by using one hand to cover our eyes and the other to push forward an ear in a posture of careful attention as we belt out these words. I always get a kick out of watching the children as they scrunch up their noses to concentrate.

Being a good listener is certainly a quality and skill that is valued in the business world, education and all carebased industries. I find it interesting, however, that for many of us, when we encounter another person who chooses to share with us their personal struggles, it is challenging to focus on the 'listening'. Instead, we often respond to the person offering solutions (I have certainly been guilty

of this), sharing similar experiences or sometimes, out of discomfort, changing the topic altogether.

For the past two summers, I have spent significant time as a student in the Spiritual Care departments of CAMH and the University Health Network, as well as dozens of hours with congregants and their families who have been ill, in mourning or troubled in another way. My most important realization is this: simply hearing the plight of another person, affirming the experience and feelings being shared with us and being a witness to their suffering is incredibly difficult, but is also an amazing gift we can offer. As caring human beings, and as a holy community, it is our responsibility to be present for people at their darkest times.

Without a doubt, the rabbis and clergy (klei kodesh) of Beth Tzedec, of which I am incredibly honoured to be part, spend a significant amount of time trying to care for our community in this way. Because bikkur holim (caring for the sick and those who need emotional support) is a community responsibility, we want to invite you to join us in this mitzvah.

We are now organizing a threepart training session to be held on October 25 and November 1 & 8, led by Dr. Elaine Cooper who will help us develop our listening skills and other traits to more effectively assist our community members in need. On Sunday, October 15, we will host a bikkur holim initiative making soup that will be taken to our elderly and ill members during *besed* visits. We hope you will roll up your sleeves and

May we be blessed with a year of peace and fulfilment.





### A Call to Action

A family-friendly story for the High Holy Days.



#### LONG BEFORE THE INVENTION OF THE FIRE TRUCK, MOST

houses were built of wood. So a fire was a terrible thing. A small fire gone astray could end up burning down the entire town. When a fire broke out, the whole community left work or school and rushed to help put out the fire.

There used to be a watchtower that was taller than all the other buildings, where a watchperson kept a lookout all the time. As soon as they saw any sign smoke or fire, they would sound the alarm. The townspeople would then form a human chain between the fire and the nearest well, and pass each other pails of water with which to put out the fire.

A boy from a small village came to town for the first time, and stopped at an inn on the outskirts of the town. Suddenly, he heard the sound of a bugle. He asked the innkeeper what it meant.

"Whenever we have a fire," the innkeeper explained, "we sound the bugle, and the fire is quickly put out."

"How wonderful," thought the boy. "What a surprise I will bring to my own village!"

So the boy went and bought himself a bugle. When he returned to his village, he was full of excitement. He called all the villagers together. "Listen, good people," he exclaimed. "No need to be afraid of fire any more. Just watch me, and see how quickly I will put out a fire!"

Saying this, he ran to the nearest hut and set fire to its straw roof. The fire began to spread very quickly.

"Don't be alarmed," shouted the boy. "Now, watch me!" The boy began to blow the bugle with all his might, interrupting it only to catch his breath and to say, "Wait, this will put out the fire in no time!" But the fire did not seem to care much for the music, and merely hopped from one roof to another until the entire village was in flames.

The villagers began to yell at the boy. "You fool," they cried. "Did you think that just blowing the trumpet would put the fire out? It is only an alarm, to wake up the people if they are asleep, or to break them away from their work or school and send them to the well to get water and put out the fire!"

We are reminded of this story when we think of the shofar that is sounded many times on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. For the boy from the story, the sound of the shofar is the only thing required to put out the fire.

But, like the bugle in the story, the shofar is simply the sound of an "alarm". It has a message: "Wake up, sleepyheads, think about your ways to return to God and put out the 'fire' that is threatening to destroy your Jewish homes. Go to the well—the Torah and *mitzvot*—hurry, before it is too late!"

Happy New Year to the entire Beth Tzedec community, and may you all have meaningful High Holy Days!

Kallat Torah Mary Ellen Herman and Hattan Bereisheet Mark Lapedus at our Simhat Torah services and luncheon. Mary Ellen and Mark have demonstrated outstanding dedication to our Beth Tzedec community and join our distinguished list of honourees.

### Mary Ellen Herman —Kallat Torah

Mary Ellen's family connection to Beth Tzedec began in 1890s when her grandparents Sophie and Isadore Caplan arrived in Toronto having escaped the pogroms raging through Europe. Isadore was a regular shul goer who could be found on Shabbat sitting just below the Rabbi's pulpit. Mary Ellen received her earliest Jewish education in the Beth Tzedec Congregational School as a member of the school's Honour Class. Her passion for learning continued as an adult, and when she decided it was time to learn the Torah trop, she did.

With her late husband Michael, she shared a love of learning. They were regulars in Rabbi Baruch Frydman-Kohl's classes, and were strongly influenced by his teachings and the depth of Jewish thought. Together with their two children, they made Beth Tzedec their religious home and established close relationships with the shul's clergy and members.

Mary Ellen has traveled many times to Israel, has joined Professor Berk on his study trip to Eastern Europe and became a volunteer docent with the Holocaust Centre. One of her personal pivotal moments came when she helped found the Out of the Cold partnership with Beth Sholom, as part of the Beth Tzedec *Hesed* Committee. She has helped families facing bereavement issues and has held numerous leadership positions while supporting special projects and programs.

A woman of intense strength and courage, Mary Ellen has faced life's challenges always believing in the power of the human spirit. Her tenacity to keep moving forward is fueled by her desire to do what she can do to improve life for others and how she can soften their blows.

Shortly after the tragic loss of their daughter, Elizabeth Rose, the Hermans dedicated the wonderful Rose Garden that beautifies the Bathurst entrance to the Synagogue in

her memory. A committed community builder, Mary Ellen has been an angel at the Hospital for Sick Children, and most recently, dedicated the Michael and Mary Ellen Herman Banquet Hall at Beth Tzedec.

### Mark Lapedus—Hattan Bereisheet

Mark and his family joined Beth Tzedec on the occasion of their youngest daughter's Bat Mitzvah, which coincided with the arrival of Rabbi Baruch Frydman-Kohl, after being members of Shaarei Shomayim for a number of years.

Mark is commencing his 13<sup>th</sup> year as president of the Men's Club that he has helped to maintain as a vital part of the Synagogue community. He also served on the Board of Governors as the Men's Club representative for 11 years. Mark has played a leading and active role in all Men's Club activities, including the Sunnybrook Shabbat services, fundraisers such as the annual Men's Club Golf Classic, programs to support youth and adult education as well as the Yom Hashoah candle campaign.

Mark completed an Honours B.A. in English from the University of Toronto and a law degree from Osgoode Hall. He attended Associated Hebrew Day School from Kindergarten through Grade 13, and was a member of the second graduating class at the Community Hebrew Day School, which became CHAT in 1966.

Mark's parents recognized the importance of a Jewish education and instilled in Mark a desire to contribute to the Jewish community. His grandfather Zev Barenholtz, whose downtown Jewish bookstore was the centre of the community throughout Mark's youth, also influenced him. He regularly studied with his grandfather, and learned how to *daven* and interpret text. His grandfather also taught Mark about what was important in life as a Jew.

Mark is married to Jan, a former principal and teacher of the Leo Baeck Day School. They are very proud of their children Justin, Aimee and Jillian (Andrew Bier), and their grandchildren Jake, Ryan, Cole and Aiden. The eldest three attend Robbins Hebrew Academy and Jake will be celebrating his Bar Mitzvah in September at Beth Tzedec.

Mark has expressed gratitude and humility in being selected for this honour.

### Bill Glied: Glad I Met Him

Gerry Posner profiles Beth Tzedec member and noted community speaker, Bill Glied.



#### THERE ARE MANY REMARKABLE STORIES

of survival from the Holocaust. Bill Glied has shared his with thousands of students, and his story has been retold several times in the press. However, what may be considered most remarkable about his testimony is the emphasis he places in the role of hope in his survival.

It is very hard to believe that a person could maintain a sense of hope given what was going on all around him. But his hope was fostered by his father, Alexander, who managed to stay by his side in the selection process in Auschwitz-Birkenau, that same process which sealed the fate of Bill's mother, Miriam, and sister, Anniko. Bill says it was his father, who sadly died nine days before the liberation, who really kept him alive and hopeful.

Bill came to Canada as one of the first war orphans admitted to this country. He was initially taken in by his aunt and uncle who had arrived earlier. It was not long, though, before he was on his own.

His first task was to learn English, and based on the way he speaks, he learned it well. Perhaps it was fluency in Serbian, Hungarian, German and Yiddish that helped him pick up a another new language so quickly. After a few odd jobs, Bill was invited to join a fellow immigrant from his home country, the former Yugoslavia, in the lumber business.

He and his new wife Marika, a Holocaust survivor from Budapest, moved to Maple, Ontario where he worked and ultimately established a business. They had three children, and the family and business flourished. Later, Bill also partnered in a construction company and other

ventures, in which he is now joined by two of his daughters.

Bill has enjoyed business success, but his humble manner and warm demeanour—not to mention his flowing silver hair, has remained. To him, far more important than his business success has been the reach he has had in taking the lessons of the Holocaust across the province and beyond.

His focus these days is keeping the memory of those who perished in the Holocaust alive, and ensuring that those lessons are never forgotten. He has spoken in most Canadian provinces, and in May 2017, he shared his message with over 2,000 people at a Catholic church and at a packed Agudas Achim Synagogue in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan.

Surely, when you reflect on what you have accomplished in your life, positively influencing another person would be perhaps one of the most satisfying accomplishments. Bill has done just that as he has taken the history of the Holocaust and transmitted the causes, brutality and lessons to people who have had no direct connection to Jews, let alone the Holocaust.

He has opened the eyes of many students so much so that he receives gifts and cards from them regularly. One student in P.E.I. was so moved by Bill's words that she drew a moving image of a Jewish prisoner in the Holocaust, a picture Bill keeps framed in his home. His willingness and ability to speak, and his charming manner makes him an invaluable teacher and mentor. In addition to speaking in schools and other venues, Bill also travels with Jewish teenagers

to concentration camps in Poland and then to Israel as part of the March of the Living.

Over the last few years, Bill has testified as a witness in two trials against S.S. officers who served at Auschwitz-Birkenau. He felt strongly about the significance of the verdicts being handed down in a German courtroom. The confirmed guilty verdict against Oskar Groening, and Bill's evidence given in honour of the family he lost, will remain in the German court record forever.

I wondered what it was that drove Bill to continue to share his story as far and as often as he can, despite how difficult it is to recount his experience. He has been asked many times and replies, "Once I became a grandfather [he has eight grandchildren] about the horrors of the Holocaust, no matter how painful. I have a duty, literally an obligation, to tell people and to send a message to kids today that they should realize this can happen."

That he is connected to Judaism still is remarkable. Even though he wrestles with God in his quest to understand why he survived when others did not, he has had and continues to have a loyal connection to Beth Tzedec for well over 50 years. He fondly remembers the late Rabbi Stuart Rosenberg<sup>2"1</sup> welcoming him to Beth Tzedec and officiating alongside Cantor Joseph Cooper<sup>2"1</sup> at his wedding to Marika in 1959. Bill identifies Beth Tzedec as an integral part of his life to this day.





This program is an excellent opportunity for bar/bat mitzvah-aged students to participate in a meaningful tzedekah project. Community service hours are available to high school students.

Out of the Cold is completely self-funded, relying on contributions from members of the Congregation and the community at large. We are always in need of new or gently used **adult** clothing, specifically down coats and ski jackets, winter, hiking or construction boots, running shoes, sweatpants and sweatshirts, t-shirts, sweaters and jeans as well as new sleeping bags and blankets. Please do not donate summer clothing items. Donations should be bagged, labeled and dropped off at Beth Sholom, weekdays between 9:00 AM and 4:00 PM, after November I. If you need to drop off donations sooner, please contact me to arrange it. Hotel-size toiletries are very popular, and can be dropped off anytime at Beth Tzedec.


## Minyan of Comfort Initiative
