On the Trail

In our century, we are experiencing the "future shock" foreseen by Alvin Toffler, when individuals and groups perceive "too much change in too short a period of time".

HIKING IN ISRAEL AS PART OF THE UJA CENTENNIAL

Mission, I was awestruck by the raw desert landscape of the Ramon Crater, the lush plant and animal life of Ein Avdat and Nahal Katlav, and the steep trails in each of these locations. At the International Birding and Research Center in Eilat, I was reminded of the strategic land-bridge that Israel provides, enabling avian migration between Africa and EurAsia. One of the great gifts of Zionism to the Jewish people has been a reawakening of awareness of the natural beauty of the Land of Israel. That love is celebrated on Tu B'Shevat (the 15th of the Hebrew month, marked this year on January 31).

Our appreciation and celebration of the Land of Israel takes on a deeper dimension during Pesah when we read the Song of Songs. Elaine James explores how *Shir Hashirim* creates a "landscape of desire" linking physiography and poetry, landscape and lyric, fragile human love and the complexity of the natural world (*Landscapes of the Song of Songs*). Our younger members who have hiked the Israel Trail tell of the great beauty of the journey and have countless stories of human kindness, of the "trail angels" who support and encourage them. As the Purim narrative of Mordekhai and Esther states, "help and support comes from other places".

In the past, great religious authorities have pointed to Esther as an exceptional woman who only briefly ventured into the political challenges of ancient Persia. Even the *megillah* that bears her name ends with a focus on the leadership role of Mordekhai. Rabbinic commentators from the past to the present—have suggested that the Biblical verse, "The daughter of the King is glorious in the inner chamber" (Psalm 45:14) indicates that Jewish women should not have a place in public ritual.

But we know that during the Hasmonean revolt, Jewish women played a significant role, acclaimed by the inclusion of women in the lighting of the Hanukkah menorah. We also recognize that, while the role of women in public Jewish ritual was minimal, some Jewish women were involved in commerce, played a role in the governance of community affairs and had a place of social (and even religious) prominence in synagogue life.

At Beth Tzedec, we have been on a long trail. Over a period of almost a quarter-century, I have composed a series of responsa (*teshuvot*, legal decisions) that has



gradually created a place for women in the public ritual of Beth Tzedec. As possibilities opened, women have embraced Torah *aliyot* and reading, been welcomed in the minyan (quorum) for prayer and are now forging roles as leaders of public prayer. While initially hesitant, they have gradually discovered their voice. It has been heartening and inspiring to watch.

Through this extended process, I have also been learning. I have trained myself to read rabbinic texts with a new eye and fresh perspective, to discover in our classical texts a warrant for greater inclusion. My evolving approach has been to create an *halakhic* basis for each development and to allow for communal adjustment and acceptance. Through these years, my rabbinic colleagues have both challenged and supported me. And after each period of consolidation, our Congregation was prepared for other possible considerations.

A similar process occurs in our calendar during the winter-spring season. Tu B'Shevat, a day that signals that spring in the Land of Israel is on the way, is still chilly. The holiday is a harbinger of a process from the first almond buds (a natural occurrence, without any overt Divine activity) to the remarkable turnabout of Purim (a human saga without the mention of God in the narrative), culminating in the redemptive narrative of the Exodus (where God is fully engaged in the Exodus). Our Torah tradition appreciates that God may be found in the slow and subtle evolution of nature, society and Jewish law.

The Hanukkah heroism of Hannah and Judith, the courageous intervention of Esther and the redemptive acts of significant women in Egypt (the two midwives to the Hebrew women; Yoheved, Moshe's mother; Miryam, his sister and saviour; and Pharoah's daughter) remind us of the importance of women to the sacred history of our people. That role was not only in the past. I see it reaching into the future.

Just as Zionism triggered a reawakened love of the Land of Israel, I hope that the *halakhic* developments within Beth Tzedec will give rise to a revival of synagogue life. Just as rigorous hiking requires dedication, time and serious preparation, so does reading Torah and leading *tefillah*. Even as women find their place on the *bimah*, I envision the girls and young women of our community being inspired to step up and become more engaged in

public prayer and congregational life. I pray that the men and boys of our community also will be challenged to increase their capacity for ritual leadership, thus becoming more connected and committed.

As I wrote regarding the composition of a minyan, "The sanctity of the Jewish people includes men and women and enables the people of Israel to be worthy of the *mitzvot*." Let us continue on this trail.

As my colleague and friend, Rabbi Adam Cutler, prepares to leave Beth Tzedec for his new role as Senior Rabbi of Adath Israel Congregation, I thank him for his stalwart support and communal creativity. He has been an exemplar of rabbinic service, responding to common concerns and extraordinary emergencies with care and concern.

Rav Adam has been responsible for initiatives to welcome Jews-by-Choice, green the synagogue, include Jews with various physical and developmental challenges, reach out to other faith communities, link us to Truth and Reconciliation projects, teach serious Torah and maintain a high profile for Beth Tzedec in the Jewish and general community.

He and Debra, as well as Jacob and Ezra, will be missed in our community. We wish them much success as they move north along Bathurst, and hope that they will continue to contribute much to the Jewish community of Toronto.

Leadership: Who Cares? No, Who Cares!

Being part of something bigger than ourselves has always been a core element of our culture.



THIS YEAR, THE UJA FEDERATION CELEBRATES ITS 100TH

anniversary as a leading voice in shaping the Toronto Jewish community. Early in my career, I worked at Federation as a social planner, helping to launch new programs. Later, I moved over to the Bequest and Endowment Fund, raising and allocating funds for special grants. It was while I was at Federation that I saw firsthand how fortunate our community is to have dedicated leaders who contribute time and money to help change the world for others.

Being a leader is a selfless task; it means time away from family, early morning and late-night meetings, asking "what if" questions, participating in telethons and canvassing friends and family to support Israel and the Jewish people around the world. It was there that I had the privilege to meet luminaries of Beth Tzedec who, through their statesmanship, were much more than "rubber stamp" committee members. I was fortunate to learn from the Gella Rothsteins and the Wilfred Posluns' (z"l) of our community how to never say "no" and to appreciate that, before you ask someone to do something, you better be prepared to do it yourself.

Movers and shakers are those who have the capacity, vision, tenacity and thick skin to know that taking a communal position may not always be popular. Leaders act not for their own personal interest but are driven by the interests of the community. While there is no shortage of "back-seat presidents" in every organization, it is those who carry the mantle of volunteerism on a board or a committee, who roll up their sleeves and do not shy away from fiduciary and moral decision making, who should be applauded. They act selflessly, solely on behalf of a congregation or membership they represent.

Many communal organizations suffer from a crisis of leadership. As in the world of politics, it can be so difficult that many choose not to even get involved. I am sure we all know someone who, after some hesitation, decided to take the well–intentioned plunge and volunteer. Sometimes from the moment that one agrees to volunteer on a board, their ability to pray, participate in programs or to freely enjoy a synagogue social event can become compromised. When one chooses to get in the kitchen, stand by the stove and try their best to be an "iron chef", they don't deserve to get burned. Rather, it is our responsibility to turn that tide, become activists and support each other's initiatives.

We have the opportunity to encourage and applaud leadership in every generation. Our organizations survive, and the beneficiaries of their work—the children, elders, impoverished or homeless—benefit only when volunteers carry out their mission-driven tasks. For more than 60 years, our congregants have been the catalysts to greatness in charitable work carried out in our city and beyond.

Beth Tzedec members have held and hold positions at every level, leading campaigns in times of crisis and peace. Beth Tzedec members have lit and carried the community torch, lighting the way for improved health care, social services, freedom for Jews in Arab lands, providing supplemental assistance to feed the hungry, helping to house and clothe the new immigrant and even sending children to summer camp to escape the heat of the city. THANK YOU FOR HONOURING ME BY calling me Rabbi.

Thank you for trusting me with your funerals, weddings, b'nei mitzvah, baby-namings and more.

Thank you for coming to me with your smiles and tears.

Thank you for welcoming me into your homes and into your lives.

Thank you for giving me space to grow.

Thank you for tolerating my failures and celebrating my accomplishments.

Thank you for teaching me about community.

Thank you for embracing Debra, then Jacob, then Ezra.

Thank you for supporting me in my decision to take on a new challenge.

Eight and a half years ago, and newly ordained, I was remarkably blessed when you chose me for North America's largest Conservative synagogue. While many of my friends found their calling in far-flung shuls with fewer than 150 member families, I had the good fortune of landing here, in the heart of a world-class city (Jewish and otherwise) that also happened to be my hometown, working under the supervision of Rav Baruch, and very quickly getting to know our 2,600 member families.

Rabbi is the only full-time employment I have ever known. As I am often told, it is not a "normal job". The hours are strange, I work every weekend, and am on-call 24/6. No two days are alike as the variety of activities demanding my attention is wide.

In other words, being a congregational rabbi is most certainly a calling—and there is no synagogue in which I would have rather been called to start my career than Beth Tzedec. I am grateful to have worked in an institution that attracts 150,000 people each year for more programs and events than any other synagogue in Toronto by a wide margin. I am indebted to Rabbi Frydman-Kohl for his leadership, vision and mentorship. The clergy and staff that Beth Tzedec has assembled demonstrate their dedication every single day in ways that most members will never know.

On March 25, I will leave Beth Tzedec to become the Senior Rabbi at Adath Israel Congregation. Even as I move two major streets up Bathurst Street, I look forward to continuing the many wonderful



relationships that I have built here at Beth Tzedec.

I hope that I have served you well. If I have hurt or offended you in any way, I ask for your forgiveness. I hope that I have both broadened and deepened your connection to God, Torah and the Jewish People.

The *Talmud*, in tractate *Berakhot*, teaches that a person should not take leave of his friend with ordinary conversation, joking, frivolity or idle talk. Rather he should leave his friend with a matter of *halakhah*, Jewish law.

Yehoshua, the son of Perahya, teaches in *Pirkei Avot* (1:6):

עשה לך רב ,וקנה לך חבר והוי; את כל האדם לכף זכות דן

Provide yourself with a teacher; acquire a companion; and judge every person in the scale of merit.

Rav Yehudah Leib of Gur, who is known as the *Sefas Emes*, notes that the term for every person, כל האדם, literally means the entirety of the person. He teaches that even if one does something improper, you must look at the totality of the individual because one's merits almost always outweighs his or her misdeeds.

Building a Better Congregational School



Our JEX Congregational School Experience at Beth Tzedec continues the legacy of our Congregation as a leader in supplementary education for children.

ALMOST 80 YEARS AGO, JOHN DEWEY, A LEADING THINKER

in progressive education, wrote a short book called *Experience & Education*. Dewey makes an argument that all educational experiences are connected to two principles—continuity and interaction. Continuity, according to Dewey, means that each experience we have in our lives will affect our future. We are products of our own past experiences. Interaction is the impact the current setting has on our experience. Essentially, every experience we engage in is filtered both through the moment itself as well as our own personal histories with past experiences.

It is no surprise then that in our Congregational and citywide community, those parents and grandparents making choices about Jewish education—determining the educational experience the child will engage in—are balancing both what they see in the marketplace (Dewey's interaction) and their own history as it relates to Jewish learning (Dewey's continuity). This occurs on both the positive and negative sides of the ledger; parents who had positive experiences in a particular place are more inclined to send their kids there, while those whose own experiences were negative will shy away from that particular school or sector for the next generation.

Synagogue-based supplementary Jewish education can face a continuity challenge. The behaviour-management techniques used by some educators in the past could be problematic in developing a positive feeling of continuity. Attendees of those past programs are now not as interested in enrolling their children and grandchildren in this sector.

This educational environment also faces an interaction challenge, especially as compared with Jewish day schools. The hours are few, often at times and on days where students—and their parents—would rather be doing other things. As a result, the facilities and programs are usually not as robust as what day schools can offer.

So where's the good news? It's here! For our supplementary school students, their experience is nothing like that of previous generations. They are set free to guide and influence their own learning with the support of caring teachers. They are engaging in learning rooted in exploration and meaning rather than rote and repetition. They are cementing existing friendships and establishing new ones. They are managing to carry out Dewey's understanding of continuity, but not with a connection to the previous generations' difficult experience; rather, they are combining our ancient tradition of Jewish learning and doing with our relatively modern tradition of Jewish engagement outside of regular weekday school hours.

Our JEX Congregational School Experience at Beth Tzedec continues the legacy of our Congregation as a leader in supplementary education for children. It also fulfils every interaction written in the paragraph directly above. While the majority of our Congregants' children are engaged in the Jewish day school sector—which is a feather in our Congregational cap—we also have children in our community not engaged in formal Jewish learning. Furthermore, there are many unaffiliated families who are looking for a high-quality Jewish education program for their children.

Let us together continue to build and strengthen our school. Please reach out to me to learn more about the JEX Congregational School Experience. Whose House is It? Our House!

It's no surprise that Beth Tzedec is a *kehillah kedoshah*, but what has been tremendously exciting for me are the new ways that we are being inspired and inspiring one another.

THIS MIGHT COME AS A SURPRISE, BUT

growing up, I was never on my school basketball team, nor really on any competitive team for that matter. Though my actual athletic ability wouldn't have contributed much to my team's potential success on the court, I do believe they missed out on having my positive energy (ruah)! Of all the cheers used at the end of team huddles, my all-time favourite has always been-"Whose house is it? Our house! Our house!"-that often gets shouted over and over again by the home team. Something about the pride, intensity and ownership moved me, even if I wasn't one of the players on the court.

We learn in the Torah that after leaving the land of Israel, Jacob has an encounter with the Divine that takes the form of a dream in which angels are ascending and descending a ladder. Upon waking up, Jacob exclaims: "This is the house of God, and I had no idea!" Jacob was surprised by both the location and the way in which he interacted with God. This revelation inspired him to call that place Beit El—the House of God.

In a recent conversation with Randy Spiegel, our executive director, he reminded me of the importance of explicitly pointing out to the many members that I interact with each week the simple but crucial reality that Beth Tzedec is "their house". Indeed, in my two years as part of the Beth Tzedec community, I have encountered many wonderful members who, for years, have viewed Beth Tzedec as "their house"—a place where they actively built community, made friends, learned, celebrated family simbahs, mourned and of course, interacted with God. I have also met new members who, from the get-go, have been building connections and finding ways to make Beth Tzedec the spiritual home they have been searching for. Some examples of this include a same-sex couple who are trying to help us as a community be more welcoming to LGBTQ Jews, and another new member who has inspired us to add a Holocaust-themed opera into our programming for 2018. They have recognized that this is "their house" and they are taking ownership and responsibility for it.

It's no surprise that Beth Tzedec is a *kehillah kedoshah*, a holy community committed to meaningful encounters with the other and with God, but what has been tremendously exciting for me are the new ways that we are being inspired and inspiring one another. In the next few months, we will be exploring our connection to and learning about Israel in a multitude of ways, beginning with our Shabbat Shirah weekend celebrating 70 years of Israeli music, highlighting the work of Naomi Shemer. As well, as we are now including both men and women within the complete realm of prayer leaders, we hope that dozens if not hundreds more people will find new ways of expressing their Iewishness and connection to our community as *shali'ah tzibbur*, prayer leaders. Our second Spiritual Sounds Lab will be an opportunity for many of us to develop new skills with the talented Deborah Sacks Mintz. We will also have several opportunities to honour Rav Adam Cutler who has brought so much life and wisdom to "our house" for close to a decade.

If you have been having a hard time figuring out how to get involved, but are thirsty to do so, I would love to get to know more about your passions and help connect you to the right opportunities.

This is an exciting time for our community, and I hope that throughout it all, you find a greater connection to both the physical space that we call Beth Tzedec, and the people and experiences found within it. Whose house is it? Our house!

Ab Flatt-Right on Key

moment in its history on Bathurst Street. On a Shabbat morning at the Synagogue, one of its oldest members, one who has been a member almost from the time the building was built and opened in 1955, had an aliyah. Not only did he have an aliyah, but also, he was one of likely a handful of men who can say that he received the honour of the aliyah in the very same spot and the very same Sanctuary where he was married a mere 60 years earlier. Ab Flatt can make that statement, and in fact he did. His wife Phyllis (née Wolfe) also commented on and confirmed that significant marker. It was quite a moment for those present to be a part of the day, not the least of who were Ab and Phyllis.

The connection to Beth Tzedec started simply enough for the Lithuanian lad who came to Canada as a five year old, who later became a practicing pharmacist and is now a nonagenarian. Phyllis' parents, Max and Beatrice Wolfe, had a long-standing relationship to the Congregation, even before its transformation into 'Beth Tzedec'. Ab took to the Synagogue with ease and has continued his devotion to it ever since he joined in 1957. If you want to witness for yourself a form of Ab's relationship to Beth Tzedec, just come to any Shabbat service and you will find him present in his seat in either the Hendeles Chapel or Sanctuary, in the seats once occupied by his late father-in-law. Ab is what might be termed a regular, and Beth Tzedec values people like him who attend each and every week.

Ab's connection to Beth Tzedec is far deeper than just attending. Over the years, he has served by sitting on many committees including Membership and Cemetery, and is a former Board member. He has also participated in fundraising campaigns. Most of all, Ab has been a key wheel in the continuing operation of Camp Ramah in Canada, a project very dear to his heart—and indeed to Beth Tzedec—which, once upon a time, was one of three major synagogues responsible in the creation of the camp some 60 years ago.

Camp Ramah, located in Utterson, Ontario, is operated under the auspices of the Jewish Theological Seminary. It was the very first camp opened in Canada as a Ramah Camp, though there were several operating in the United States at that time. Ab undertook the job of getting this camp going, and clearly succeeded as it continues to thrive to this day. Ab was even Chairman of the Ramah Board for eight years, and that effort alone deserves a medal.

What Ab emphasizes about Ramah, a camp that serves 500 children from Ontario and the surrounding area, is this: "One of the by-products of being a Ramah camper is that any camper can walk into any synagogue and be familiar with the prayers and liturgy." Ab proudly states that all of his and Phyllis' four children, now adults, and their 14 grandchildren are former or present day Ramah campers. It gives Ab a real sense of satisfaction that Camp Ramah is a vital part of summer life which especially includes the Tikvah Program for children with special needs.

Arising from Ab's involvement with Camp Ramah was a strong connection to the Jewish Foundation for Jewish Camp, an organization which oversees the not-for-profit Jewish camps in North America. In fact, Ab became one of the few Canadians ever to be on this Board, where he served for more than seven years. Ab recognizes the importance of camping. and has worked hard to assist in the development of programs that reach out to children who otherwise might be denied this experience as a result of financial issues or other reasons. All of this from a guy who spent but one week at camp as a youth.

Ab is quick to acknowledge that he hads been fortunate to work for many years with the Wolfe family business, the Oshawa Food Group. He was active both in the produce and pharmaceutical divisions where his obvious interpersonal skills were an asset. He recognizes how lucky he has been, and marvels at how life has unfurled for him. And yet, when he and Phyllis reflect on the highlights of their lives to date, surely the one that might be the most meaningful is the knowledge that all of their four children and 14 grandchildren are connected to Beth Tzedec and their Judaism in a significant way. What joy that must be for a grandparent to see the traditions and feelings you fostered continue in the generations that have followed. That is *Naḥahs* with a capital N!

You could say that Ab Flatt's devotion in so many areas of Jewish life to Beth Tzedec and beyond has been anything but flat. Right on key, we would all agree!

Your Guide to Pesah Observance

The master narrative of a religion or nation lies at the core of a community's history and ritual. The master story of Judaism is the Exodus of a people from Egypt, the national journey to Mt. Sinai and the long trek to the Promised Land. As Rabbi Elliot Dorff has observed, "This is very different from the staunch individualism at the heart of the liberalism that has forged most Western countries."

The sacred story of our Covenant, our connection to each other and God, gives Judaism its mission and infuses Passover with deep meaning. We re-enact the Exodus through story and song, through recounting and ritual. We restrict our diet, clean our homes and prepare our souls to reinforce the message of the Exodus. This guide to observance is intended to help you reach back in time and to project forward in imagination. "By doing the finite, we perceive the infinite" (Heschel).

Background

The Torah prohibits the ownership of *hametz* (leavened grain or its derivative) during Pesah. Therefore, we either destroy or arrange for the sale of the *hametz* to a non-Jew. The transfer, *mekhirat hametz*, is accomplished by appointing an agent, usually the rabbi, to handle the sale. It is a valid and legal transfer of ownership. If ownership of the *hametz* is not transferred before the holiday, the use of this *hametz* is prohibited after the holiday as well.

Since the Torah prohibits the eating of *hametz* during Pesah, and since many common foods contain some mixture of *hametz*, careful attention is necessary when shopping and preparing for Pesah.

During the eight days of Pesah, *hametz* cannot lose its identity in a

mixture. Therefore, even a minute amount of *hametz* renders the whole mixture *hametz* and its use on Pesah is prohibited. However, during the rest of the year, *hametz* follows the normal rules of mixture, i.e., it loses its identity in a mixture of one part *hametz* and 60 parts of non-*hametz* (*batel be-shishim*). This affords us the opportunity to differentiate between foods purchased before and during Pesah.

Practical

What follows is only a general guideline. Rabbi Frydman-Kohl should be consulted when any doubt arises. *"Kosher le-*Pesah" labels that do not bear the name of COR or one of the recognized symbols of rabbinic supervision, or which are not integral to the package, should not be used without consulting Rabbi Frydman-Kohl.



Erev Pesah—hametz burning Friday, March 30 from 9:00 to 11:00 AM

Prohibited Foods

Foods derived from wheat, barley, oats, spelt, rye. These include leavened bread, cakes, biscuits, crackers, pasta, cereal, coffees containing cereal derivatives, whiskeys and all liquids containing ingredients or flavours made from grain alcohol. Ashkenazi Jews also avoid kitniyot. The Committee on Jewish Law & Standards permits the consumption of kitniyot, but our rabbis recommend that you continue the historic custom of avoiding rice, corn, millet and legumes (beans, soy and peas). COR now labels some products as Kosher for Passover for Sefardim. Many Israeli products contain kitniyot. If you have Ashkenazic roots, those products are NOT for you. If you are a vegetarian or have a medical condition that prohibits wheat/gluten, etc., please consult with Rabbi Frydman-Kohl.

Permitted Foods

I. If purchased prior to Pesah, the following foods do not require a *kosher le*-Pesah label: unopened packages or containers of unflavoured natural ground coffee (not decaf) without cereal additives; sugar; pure tea (not herbal tea); salt (not iodized); pepper; natural spices; unshelled nuts, whole raw nuts, quinoa (with nothing added); frozen fruit juices with no additives; milk; butter; cottage cheese; cream cheese; frozen (uncooked) fruit (with no additives); baking soda; extra virgin olive oil.

2. If purchased before or during Pesah, the following products do not require a *kosher le*-Pesah label: fresh fruits and vegetables (not legumes, see above); eggs; fresh fish and fresh kosher meat; frozen fish (without additives); bottled water; unflavoured dental floss. **3.** If purchased before or during Pesah, the following foods require a *kosher le*-Pesah label: All baked products (matzah, cakes, matzah flour, farfel, matzah meal, and any products containing matzah); canned or bottled fruit juices (juices are often clarified with *kitniyot*); decaf coffee; herbal teas; canned tuna; wine; liquor; vinegar; oils; ketchup; dried fruits; candy; chocolate flavoured milk; ice cream; yogurt and soda.

4. If purchased during Pesaḥ, the following foods require a *kosher le*-Pesaḥ label: all processed foods (canned, bottled or frozen); milk, butter, juices, vegetables, fruit, milk products, spices, coffee, tea and fish, as well as all foods listed in Category 3.

5. Consult Rabbi Frydman-Kohl regarding infant formula, lactose-free milk, soy/rice milk or tofu.

Non-Food Items

The following products **do not require a** *kosher le*-Pesah label: Isopropyl alcohol, oven cleaner, kosher powdered and liquid detergents, candles, plastic cutlery, aluminum foil, plastic wrap, paper plates (with no starch).

Medicine

Since *hametz* binders are used in many pills and corn syrup in liquid medication, the following guidelines should be followed: If the medicine is **required** for **life sustaining therapy**, it may be used on Pesah.

If it is not for life sustaining therapy, consult one of our rabbis. In **all cases**, capsules are preferable to pills and non-chewable medication is preferable to liquid or chewable medications.

Pet Food

Use non-grain food or, include your pet food in your sale of *hametz* and keep pet food away from the kitchen and wash utensils away from the kitchen.

Kashering of Utensils

The process of kashering utensils depends on how the utensils are used. According to *halakhah*, leaven can be purged from a utensil by the same process in which it was absorbed in the utensil (*ke-volto kakh polto*). Therefore, utensils used in cooking are kashered by boiling, those used in broiling are kashered by fire and heat, and those used only for cold food are kashered by rinsing.

Earthenware (china, pottery, etc.) cannot be kashered. However, fine translucent chinaware which has not been used for over a year may be kashered. Speak with Rabbi Frydman-Kohl.

Glassware

Glasses for drinking—to kasher, soak in water for three days, changing the water every 24 hours.

Glass Cookware or bakeware (e.g. Pyrex) cannot be kashered.

All metal utensils

Utensils used in fire (spit, broiler) Speak with our rabbis for guidance.

Utensils used for cooking or eating (all-metal, silverware, pots) must be thoroughly scrubbed, cleaned and completely immersed in boiling water. Pots should not be used for a period of at least 24 hours between the cleaning and the immersion in boiling water.

Utensils used for baking cannot be kashered.

Plastics such as tablecloths, cutlery, spatulas and storage containers cannot be made kosher for Passover. Some heavy-duty plastics may be kashered. Consult Rabbi Frydman-Kohl.

Hametz and non-Passover utensils: Non-

Passover dishes, pots and *hametz* whose ownership has been transferred prior to Pesah should be separated, locked up or covered and marked in order to prevent accidental use.

Ovens and ranges: Every part that comes in contact with food (including walls, top and bottom of oven) must be thoroughly scrubbed and cleaned. Then, oven and range should be heated as hot as possible for 30 minutes. If there is a broil setting, use it.

Self-cleaning ovens should be scrubbed, cleaned and then put through the self-cleaning cycle.

Continuous-clean ovens must be kashered in the same manner as regular ovens.

Ceramic ranges. First, clean the top thoroughly. Turn the burners on high. After the burners have been on for 30 minutes, boiling water should be poured over and around the top of the ceramic range. Be very careful to avoid scalding.

Microwave ovens, which do not cook food by means of heat, should be cleaned and left unused for at least 24 hours, after which a cup of water should be vapourized inside. A microwave oven that has a browning element cannot be kashered for Pesah.

Refrigerators must be thoroughly washed and cleaned. Liners are **not** necessary.

Dishwasher: Clean the drainage trap, filter and run a cycle with detergent. Wait 24 hours, then run another cycle with detergent.

Electrical appliances: If the parts that come into contact with *hametz* are removable, they can be kashered in the appropriate way. (If metal, follow the rules for metal utensils.) All exposed parts should be thoroughly cleaned. If the parts are not removable, the appliance cannot be kashered.

Tables, closets and counters: If used with *hametz*, they should be thoroughly cleaned and covered; then they may be used.

Kitchen sink: A metal sink can be kashered by thoroughly cleaning and then pouring boiling water over it. A porcelain sink should be cleaned **and a sink rack used**. If dishes are to be soaked in a porcelain sink, **a dish basin must be used**.

Sale of *hametz*

There are four ways we fulfil the Biblical *mitzvah* of ridding ourselves of *ḥametz* before Pesaḥ:

- we clean our homes
- we burn any remaining crumbs
- we verbally declare that any <u>hametz</u> in our possession is worthless and no longer owned by us
- finally, to ensure that there is no question about our intent to remove *hametz* from our possession, we sell our *hametz* to non-Jews who may own leavened products on Passover

You have to do the cleaning, burning and nullification yourselves, but we can assist you in the sale of your *hametz*. **Rabbi Frydman-Kohl as well as Reverend Hanick and Cantor Ezer will be available following morning services and at various times throughout the day in the week prior to Passover to enable anyone who wishes to sell their** *hametz* **to delegate to them that authority.** If your *hametz* is in a different time zone from Toronto, please speak with Rabbi Frydman-Kohl.

If you are unable to personally sell your *hametz*, please fax or send this form to the Synagogue office no later than **6:00 PM on Thursday, March 29, 2018**.

Travels in Jewish Spain

Musuem curator Dorion Liebgott recently traveled to Spain for the AEJM Conference, and reflects on her experiences and discoveries of a historical Jewish experience.



I RECENTLY ATTENDED THE 2017

Association of European Jewish Museums Conference in Toledo, Spain. This conference—*The Absence* of *Things, Jewish Museums and the Possibilities of Limitations*—proved to be one of the most significant and enlightening conferences that I have had the privilege to attend.

As curator of our Beth Tzedec Reuben and Helene Dennis Museum, attending conferences provides an opportunity to meet and learn from colleagues from around the world, to broaden my knowledge and be exposed to diverse Jewish settings. Participants in this conference came from many countries within North America, Europe and the Middle East. Many spoke on panels where we learned about their museums, the ups and downs of funding, choices of exhibits and working with the local communities.

In a keynote address, Dr. Javier Castano of the Spanish National Research Council commented on present and future dilemmas confronted by Jewish museums in Spain as they deal with the absence of objects. He expressed how an exclusive Sephardic identity is part of Jewish Spain, but questioned whether there is a role for other Jewish ethnic groups and local Jewish identities.

While the Conference provided many opportunities for learning and engaging discussions with colleagues from around the world, there is much that can be learned about the Spanish-Jewish past in the cities and towns outside the conference walls.

Toledo sits high above the Tagus River in central Spain and is famously known as the "City of the Three Cultures", referencing the influences of Christians, Muslims and Jews reflected in its history. Two synagogues still exist there. The Synagogue of El Transito, established in approximately 1356, had originally been known as the Synagogue Samuel ha-levi after its founder, Samuel ha-levi Abulafia. His family served Castilian kings for generations and included kabbalists and Torah scholars. After the expulsion of the city's Jews in 1492, the synagogue was converted into a church, and later was used as military headquarters during the Napoleonic Wars. It eventually became a national monument and is now known as the Sephardi Museum.

The workmanship throughout is magnificent, with lace-like patterns and inscriptions in Hebrew and quotations from Psalms, as well as Arabic inscriptions intertwined with the floral patterns in the stucco panels. Through an archway, visitors can view exhibits of Judaica and local history.

A second synagogue, Santa María la Blanca, was originally identified as the Ibn Shushan Synagogue, or the Congregational Synagogue of Toledo, and was erected in 1180. It is unequivocally considered the oldest synagogue building in Europe still standing, and is owned and preserved by the Catholic Church. It was created in the Islamic style of architecture for Jewish use, and is an example of the cooperation that existed among the three cultures during the Middle Ages.

After three intensive days of study, I travelled to Barcelona, Girona and Besalu to view the remnants of ancient Jewish communities. In Girona in the quarter of the Calle (referring to the Jews), there is the Museum of Jewish History. Visitors learn about aspects of everyday life, culture and history of the Jewish communities of Catalonia and Girona during medieval times. The most outstanding part of the museum is the collection of 29 tombstones inscribed with the names of the deceased Jewish inhabitants, and more recently, an ancient mikveh has been discovered.

The charming, ancient town of Besalu has a unique history of Jewish heritage in Catalonia. In addition to the remains of the synagogue that closed in the 13th century, a 12th century *mikveh* is considered the treasure of the Jewish Calle in Besalu.

There are few reminders of historical Jewish life in Barcelona, other than a street called Calle de Call and an excavated old synagogue, both still very much worth visiting. A *mikveh* can be found under a present-day restaurant in the area.

The horrors of the Inquisition and expulsion of the Jews from Spain dispersed them to countries in the Mediterranean, North Africa and Europe, and in so doing, spread the traditions and culture of the *Sephardim*. It is, however, still rewarding to visit Spain and learn about the Jews who lived there in peace and harmony with their Spanish neighbours for more than a millennium.











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Centennial Journey of Discovery

IN EARLY NOVEMBER, HUNDREDS OF MEMBERS OF THE GTA'S

Jewish community travelled to Israel as part of the UJA Centennial Journey, marking 100 years since the founding of our local federation and the Balfour Declaration in 1917. Billed as the trip of a lifetime, the journey moved and inspired through a range of experiences and excursions. From Tel Aviv to Jerusalem, Sderot to Eilat, from the shuks to the Arava desert, the Ramon crater to the Red Sea, travellers witnessed and absorbed the historical, spiritual, social, political and cultural sights and sounds of Israel.

The Beth Tzedec community was strongly represented on this Journey, with 54 members taking part, including Rabbi Baruch Frydman-Kohl, the president of our Congregation, Dr. Sheldon and Patti Rotman and Larry and Nina Wallach, who chaired our delegation.

At each step along the way, participants absorbed the atmosphere, shared by local citizens and civic leaders. National dignitaries, including Tzipi Livni, Israel's first Vice Prime Minister and founder of the Hatnuah Party, Jerusalem's mayor Nir Barkat, Natan Sharansky, chair of the Jewish Agency for Israel, and Canada's Ambassador to Israel Deborah Lyons, welcomed the group. They also met with many of our former *shinshinim* (young emissaries), and learned from a former Tanenbaum Fellow, Rabbah Chaya Rowen Baker, about the challenges to Jewish religious pluralism in Israel.

This truly was a community journey to remember!
