Israel Today

It has been a special privilege to live in Jerusalem in the days leading up to the celebration of Israel's 70th year of independence.

neighbourhood near San Simon park, adjacent to the Saint Simeon monastery. In 1948, the hill was the scene of intense fighting between Arabs and Jews, described in *Pigeon and Boy*, a poignant novel by Meir Shalev about home and war, the search for friendship and love, and the need for security and hope. I love the area, with buildings featuring Arab design motifs, streets named for critical military events of the first years of Israel, and many young people seeking partners, expecting babies or raising young families.

It has been a special privilege to live in Jerusalem in the days anticipating the celebration of Israel's 70th year of independence. This is a time to recall the sacrifices involved to sustain this Jewish commonwealth. I walk on *Lamed Heb* (which means 35), named in memory of the 35 young men who were ambushed in 1948 as they attempted to deliver supplies to a group of besieged kibbutzim. I stand waiting for my granddaughter's school bus near the Patt junction where 19 people were killed and 74 wounded in a suicide bombing in June 2002.

Yehudah Amichai's words still ring true:

I've come back to this city where names are given to distances as if to human beings and the numbers are not of bus routes but: 70 After, 1917, 500 Before, Forty eight. These are the lines You really travel on. *(from "Jerusalem 1967")*

This is also a time to celebrate Israel's achievements. It experiences continued economic growth, diplomatic advances and improved national security. Arts and culture are flourishing, often fusing Western and *Mizrahi* traditions. Efforts are under way to upgrade infrastructure, education and social services for Arab citizens. Important initiatives are in process to integrate the *Haredi* sector into the workforce. "Bit by bit, step by step, here a little and there a little," Israel is addressing its social challenges.

Investment in start-ups and new business opportunities (a \$15 billion contract to sell natural gas to Egypt was signed in February) seem to happen every week. The rail system is expanding and the Jerusalem–Tel Aviv high-speed train will initiate service this year. Housing and office construction is seen everywhere. Cafés and restaurants are crowded, with more tourists in 2017 than ever before (3.6 million). Israel has deepened ties with India and Japan, opened new relationships in Africa, and quietly expanded connections with Arab nations. This spring, the U.S. embassy will officially open in Jerusalem.

Despite the tragedies of two terrorist killings during our visit, there has been a significant reduction in successful attacks. Hamas tunnels from Gaza have been destroyed; hopefully, new technology will prevent future incursions. The northern borders with Syria and Lebanon remain a potential flashpoint (an Israeli piloted F-16 was lost due to Syrian use of Russian anti-aircraft fire), yet Israel maintains strategic superiority to Syrian, Iranian and Hezbollah forces in the area.

As Ambassador Deborah Lyons told me when we enjoyed tea together at the Israel Museum, everywhere she looks, she sees Israeli enterprise, culture and diplomatic opportunity expanding. Hopefully, she will expand on this perspective when she visits Beth Tzedec on May 14. While the participation of other diplomats depends on other factors, mark your calendar now for what promises to be an historic evening.

After 70 years, Israel still faces significant challenges. The prospect of fruitful negotiations with the Palestinians is dim and the viability of a two-state solution is more difficult to imagine. Economic growth has left a significant number of citizens behind; the gap between rich and poor is among the greatest of all developed countries. Settlement in rural areas of Judea and Samaria remains problematic and is a source of future conflict and contention. Security issues loom large as Iran extends its influence in the region and funds surrogates at the borders of Israel. Whether Israel will resettle more African migrants has been a topic of intense moral debate. Legal accusations of corruption affect the trust of citizens and create political instability at the highest level of government.

While seeking to remain a Jewish democracy, issues of religion and state continue to impinge on the freedom of many Israelis and contribute to a growing gap between Diaspora and Israeli Jews. The Masorti movement continues to grow (I was at the celebration of its 40th year), but there are many impediments to the acceptance of Conservative and Reform Judaism in Israel.

Ruth Gavison, Israel Prize laureate in law and founder of the Metzilah Centre for human rights, spoke at the Masorti celebration about Zionism as a movement to

create a country where Jews would be a majority. To be a "free people in our own land" is both a privilege and responsibility. As a democratic state, Israel must preserve minority rights for Arab citizens and conform to international standards for human rights, while maintaining a Jewish identity that is a blend of *halakhic* and secular. This calls for constant monitoring, ongoing public dialogue and a willingness to accept many messy compromises. Israel, after 70 years, is both a great achievement and a work in progress.

We have been privileged at Beth Tzedec to maintain a strong relationship with Israel. This year, over 50 members participated in the UJA Centennial Journey. Our members are involved in many pro-Israel advocacy and philanthropic efforts. We host guest speakers from Israel and have welcomed young Emissaries, our *shinshinim*, for more than a decade. Israel engagement is high on our congregational agenda, even as we recognise Israel's flaws and challenges.

Recently, Rabbi Donniel Hartman opened a discussion about Diaspora-Israeli relations with the metaphor of children who grow up, leave home, yet return and feel no need to ask to open the refrigerator or go into "their room". Parents, who come to visit their children's home, may have a key to the children's apartment, but wouldn't use it without permission. Their home is ours, but not quite.

Diaspora and Israeli Jews are still working through the implications of a loving, maturing and, sometimes, critical relationship. We may have to accept some messy compromises, but Shalev's novel of love now and pre-1948 reminds us of how deeply we are tied to each other, "of what home is, and why we, like pigeons trained to fly in one direction only, must eventually return to it."

I am delighted that Rav Adam will become the Senior Rabbi at Adath Israel Congregation. His rabbinic relationship to Beth Tzedec began as the Anne and Max Tanenbaum Fellow while still at the Jewish Theological Seminary and continued, following his ordination, for almost eight years. I shall deeply miss him, Debra, Jacob and Ezra. Rav Adam has grown during his service to our congregation, become a Rabbinic Fellow of the Hartman Institute, deepened his skills in spiritual care, expanded his intellectual interests, and broadened his engagement in community issues. We have been blessed to have him as part of our community and fully expect that he will be a blessing for his new community.

As Rav Adam departs, we welcome to our rabbinic team Rabbis Jennifer Gorman and Moshe Meirovich. Rav Jen is well-known to us, having been part of our congregational community when her husband served on our rabbinic team. She is also the Executive Director of Mercaz-Masorti Canada. Rav Moshe grew up in Toronto and served at Adath Israel for the past few years, as it transitioned from its previous leadership to Rav Adam. A trained hazzan, Rabbi Meirovich is also connected to Beth Tzedec by family ties: his brother, Harvey, previously served our community. In addition to rabbinic responsibilities, Rav Jen will work in the area of Family Engagement and Rav Moshe also will support Cantor Ezer.

resources and experiences. We serve as a beacon to our families, a centre for Jewish living and a place to celebrate Jewish life. Collaboration between our spiritual, professional and lay leadership helps us create a place where the community can come to share in the gift of Judaism to enhance their own lives and contribute to the larger community.

In my years as Board chair and now as your president, we have moved forward with a number of significant changes designed to help guide our Synagogue in the years ahead. We have put in place a strategic plan, we are working on implementing key elements of that plan, we finished an impressive rebuild of the Mezzanine Hall and we approved a long-term capital renewal plan. Our objective is to make Beth Tzedec a centre where our members and the larger community will come to enhance their own lives and make the world a better place.

The most obvious signs of change are that we are searching for two new rabbis and a cantor to lead the largest Conservative Jewish community in Canada. This is a big responsibility, as the choices we make will impact our current and future membership.

The Senior Rabbi Search Committee is led by Norman Kahn, Dr. Eudice Goldberg and Bernie Gropper, and the Second Rabbi Search Committee is led by Dena Libman and Ted Zittell. Ava Kanner and Aaron Wine lead the Cantorial Search Committee and all are actively engaged in their processes. To assist us in the rabbinic search we have engaged an outside firm, DRG Search, with a stellar record in the North American Jewish community, to support our discussions with the Rabbinic Assembly (RA) and the review of potential candidates.

We hope to begin receiving applications shortly and will keep our membership up to speed as the process moves forward with all three positions. If you have questions or suggestions, send them to rabbinicsearch@beth-tzedec.org. In the meantime, below are responses to questions we have already received from members.

What is an "Interim Rabbi"?

In a period of transition, an Interim Rabbi is hired to meet the needs of a congregation on a temporary basis. A congregation may use an interim rabbi when it is in the process of going through the full search process, as is the case with Beth Tzedec at this time. As our interim measure, we have engaged Rabbis Jennifer Gorman and Moshe Meirovich to ensure that our members are well served while we undertake this comprehensive search process. We know you will welcome each of them as they begin their terms in April. (See "The Search is On" on pg. 33 for more information.)

What is a good option for Beth Tzedec?

The best and most honest answer is, we'll see. We have three vacancies and we must get the right people to fill those positions. It's important that the new leadership have the skills to implement our new strategic plan, and the people we choose must be able to work as a team. Our goal is to get the best people possible, and if it takes a bit more time and requires that we engage an interim rabbi, then that is a decision the Board will have to consider. exchange rates and taxation loom large when recruiting in the United States or abroad so the search could take more time than expected.

Where do we find a "New Senior Rabbi"?

The Rabbinic Search Committee has applied through the RA using the formal application process. The committee is working closely with the RA and an outside consultant, DRG, to develop the job descriptions for our positions. As resumes of applicants come in, we will screen them, interview those that look like a good fit, and then create a short list of candidates to bring into our community for lengthier personal visits and interviews. The membership will be notified when candidates are visiting the shul. A dedicated email account rabbinicsearch@beth-tzedec.org has been set up specifically for feedback from our Congregation and to answer additional questions.

How can I stay informed of the committee's progress? The Search Committee will use the shul's weekly eNewsletter and the quarterly *Bulletin* to keep members apprised of their progress.

What should I, as a congregant, do now?

Let us hear from you! Is there one question you would like the committee to ask the new candidate? Send in your questions to rabbinicsearch@beth-tzedec.org. We will put together the most asked questions and to incorporate in the interview process.

This is a unique time in our 63 year history. It's a time characterized by change outside and inside our shul. Your Board of Governors is sensitive to the challenges but excited by the opportunities. We are fortunate to that our Executive Director, Randy Spiegel, and his team are helping us navigate the road ahead and ensure that our Shul continues to meet the needs of our membership.

A Jewish/Zionist Identity

For many, supporting and loving Israel is at the core of their Jewish identity. So what happens to one's Jewish identity when Israel becomes a challenging, rather than strengthening, force?

THIS SPRING MARKS THE CONCLUSION OF A YEAR-LONG

celebration of meaningful Israel-related anniversaries. Beginning with the 50th year of the reunification of Jerusalem last June, and continuing to the 120th anniversary of the First Zionist Congress, the 100th anniversary of the Balfour Declaration and the 70th anniversary of the UN vote on the Partition Plan, this remarkable coincidence of roundnumber celebrations will conclude with the 70th anniversary of the establishment of the State of Israel this April.

Many of these anniversaries have prompted much conversation and naval-gazing among Israelis and the Jewish community worldwide. We have been moved to consider what Zionism was and how it currently manifests; what it means to be people with an ancestral homeland; the responsibilities that come with political and military power; the challenge of crafting a Jewish and democratic nation-state; the growing gap in closeness between Israeli and Diaspora Jews; and much more.

I have been thinking a lot about two specific realities and the challenges they pose when connecting with and relating to Israel. The first reality is that for centuries, our Jewish stance on a national return to Israel was exclusively aspirational. There was no reality in which Jews living 1,000 or 500 years ago actually believed that a Jewish-led, sovereign and independent Israel would exist in their lifetime. Many of our customs, prayers and perspectives on Israel and a return to Zion were shaped by these 1,900 years of exile, so when the 20th century presented a change to this narrative, it became difficult to square the circle. Our texts and prayers are aspirational, but they are all we have. Can we truly take these texts as our guiding principles for the new reality of statehood? On one hand, we have nothing else. On the other, they are not reflective of the complex realpolitik that continues to develop in Israel and the Middle East.

The second reality is that the majority of Jews alive today, including myself, have never known a world or a Judaism without a State of Israel. Israel has become a deeply rooted and intertwined component of our Jewish identity, both as individuals and as a community. It is natural that this happened: it is the place where national time is Jewish time, where our ancient language is spoken on the streets, a place of refuge for Jews around the world, and a source of strength and security for Jews in the Diaspora. It was created three years after the Holocaust and made secure only 19 years after that, both events showing that Israelis were willing to fight for their cause, and causing such tremendous whiplash—meaning that both 1948 and 1967 were such dramatic turns from the events that preceded them—that the world could not help but take notice.

This reality presents some challenges, resulting in a Jewish and Zionist identity so intertwined that it is sometimes difficult to see where one ends and the other begins. For many, supporting and loving Israel is at the core of their Jewish identity. So what happens to one's Jewish identity when Israel becomes a challenging, rather than strengthening, force? Is this intertwining a net benefit or a cause for concern? These are some of the questions I am thinking about, learning about and trying to educate towards in my work with children and adults in our community.

There is no doubt that the modern State of Israel has been an enrichment to the Jewish people and the Jewish world. It also challenges us to think about what a Jewish state looks like, how a Jewish state should govern itself and how it should interact with the community of nations. We, as Diaspora Jews, have a stake in the future of Israel. To paraphrase Rabbi Donniel Hartman, those of us who are not citizens, taxpayers or voters do not have a right to tell Israel and Israelis what to do. But we do have the right to tell them what we think. In today's complex and multidimensional world, I believe it is incumbent on all of us who hold Israel as part of our Jewish identity to understand how today's Israel both strengthens and questions our Jewish experience, all with the goal of coming out stronger on the other side.

Beth Tzedec and the Good Life

Judaism is a gift that, when we embrace it, enhances our lives and empowers us to make the world a better place.

THERE ARE CURRENTLY 1,200 STUDENTS at Yale—a quarter of the entire student population—enrolled in the course with the greatest number of attendees

in the history of the university titled "Psychology and The Good Life". The course was created to help students deal with the terribly high levels of anxiety and help them prioritize what is most important in their lives.

Professor Laurie Santos argues that rather than focusing on grades and internships, they should be more in tune with what research demonstrates actually leads to happiness. She argues that there are three things that all people should be doing:

1) Take time to be mindful and grateful: For five to ten minutes every day, meditate—or just sit down and write five things for which you are grateful.

2) Do nice things for others: People who give money, donate to charity or volunteer their time, those are the folks that tend to be happier. Therefore, the more nice things you can do for others, the more you'll end up increasing your own happiness.

3) Take time for yourself: Take time to do things that give you joy. Santos calls the act of focusing on these habits "rewiring".

When I heard Santos discussing her course on CBC Radio, these three pillars resonated with me and sounded quite familiar. This, of course, is because these three pillars are precisely at the core of what Judaism offers us in our lives and what Beth Tzedec does to enhance the lives of our members and community.

Judaism is a gift that, when we embrace it, enhances our lives and empowers us to make the world a better place. Beth Tzedec offers the resources to make the most of this gift and includes Lantos's pillars of happiness in a unique way. Through our Shabbat and weekday services, Jewish meditation and lifecycle experiences, we offer opportunities to reflect on our lives. For this, we should be grateful.

The Rabbis' sermons and our "Monday Night Learning" classes inspire us to find our own ways to make our world a better place. We offer ongoing *besed* opportunities through which we care for those within and outside our community. Certainly, *tzedakah* and acts of kindness and love are core to who we are as a caring community. Beth Tzedec is known for the quantity and quality of meaningful and exciting Jewish experiences that enhance our lives and feed our souls.

I have always experienced Beth Tzedec as warm and inspiring—a place where I can actualize all three of those pillars. And since my mother's death in January, I now understand the beauty of this community on a deeper level. Participating in the community of the daily minyan as a mourner, receiving sympathy cards and meals from the Synagogue leadership and members alike, the countless opportunities to share stories about my mother, and learning that so many of you chose to give tzedakah in her memory has been a true blessing in my life. I will forever be grateful for the comfort and support I have received from this community, and I am committed to helping each of you feel this way during times of joy, sorrow and everything in between.

May Beth Tzedec continue to be a source of inspiration for a good and meaningful life for us all.

Sherry Firestone– A Real Gem

Gerry Posner profiles Beth Tzedec member Sherry Firestone.

A FIRESTONE IS DEFINED AS A STONE THAT CAN WITHSTAND fire and great heat. There are not many stones that fit that description, but they are out there. In her own way, Sherry Firestone embodies her name as she has over a period of years withstood her share of heat. It comes with the territory when you involve yourself in many organizations, just as Sherry has.

The path for Sherry Barad Firestone started in Vancouver where she was born and raised. Sherry traces her passion for community involvement to her grandmother Etta Barad, who was very active with Hadassah, right down to her job as the treasurer of her chapter and chair of the handicraft booth at the Bazaar. Etta had such an impact on her granddaughter that to this day, Sherry quotes her grandmother who said "I am a very lucky person and it is a privilege to give to others." Her grandfather Hyman Dashevsky, who also inspired her to give back, was an acting Gabbai at Schara Tzedeck Synagogue in Vancouver, among other community initiatives.

Later, when Sherry attended the University of Toronto, she became involved in what were at the time the precursors to the Hillel and Birthright programs. She befriended many other out of towners who lived in the University College residence. It was not until Sherry and husband Jay, parents to Chaz and Ross, enrolled Chaz in JK at the then USDS, now the Robbins Hebrew Academy, that the sparks were lit for this Firestone. The couple ultimately found their home in the Little Minyan at Beth Tzedec. It was about that time Sherry was asked to serve on a Firestone that stands out like a gem. the board of USDS and to chair its technology committee. From that evolved work with UJA, CFHU and CJPAC.

Those are a bundle of initials and they represent a plethora of community involvement.

Sherry has always been happiest leading a busy life. She began her career as a Chartered Accountant and now works as a partner in a Toronto based commercial real estate management and development company. This background no doubt assisted her when she took on the role of chair for the 2011 Toronto UJA Federation Campaign. That was but a small part of Sherry's participation with our Federation. She sat on its Board of Directors for six years and its Executive Committee for three years. She volunteered as an Executive Member of the Koffler Centre of the Arts, as a director of the United Synagogue Day School, not to forget her role as an integral member of the Beth Tzedec Fund Raising Committee. On top of all of that, Sherry serves as the lay chair of the CIPAC (Canadian Jewish Political Affairs Committee) National Advisory Board and is a member of the Toronto Chapter of the Canadian Friends of the Hebrew University.

One could expect that Sherry is committed to these organizations and to ensuring that things go smoothly. That is where the Firestone part of her name rises to the top. You have to be prepared to make tough decisions along the way and to accept the challenges and the heat that arise. This is one Firestone that can not only endure the heat, but embraces it. Sherry learned the lesson of her grandparents well. She is now giving back to her community and finds great fulfillment in doing so. This is

The Search is On

AS YOUR BOARD OF GOVERNORS

started the search for a successor to Rav Baruch, who will retire in July 2019, we learned that Rav Adam would be leaving us at the end of March. As a result, we decided to strike an Associate Rabbi Search Committee to fill our short-term and longer-term need. Our two search committees are working together to ensure the best fit and smoothest transition for our membership from one generation of rabbinic leadership to the next.

Senior Rabbi Search Committee Co-chaired by Norman Kahn, Bernie Gropper and Dr. Eudice Goldberg, the committee members are Jay Feldman, Daniel Heller, Lianne Leboff, Dena Libman, Adam Storm, Sara Urowitz, Harold Wolfe and Josh Zelikovitz. Guided by the Strategic Plan and with direction from your Board, this committee has submitted an application to the Joint Placement Committee, the combined resource of USCJ and the Rabbinical Assembly for the placement of rabbis in the Conservative/Masorti movement. We have also engaged DRG Search, a professional consultancy with expertise in recruiting top talent for Jewish non-profits. They will partner with us in assessing the skills, depth of knowledge and experience required to lead our *kehillah* forward. We believe these combined resources will help us engage the finest rabbinic talent available to serve our members and lead Beth Tzedec now and into the future.

Associate Rabbi Search Committee

This committee is co-chaired by Dena Libman and Ted Zittell. The co-chairs of both search committees and the Board of Governors believe that the new Senior Rabbi should play a lead role in hiring this key member of our spiritual leadership team. As the need for an associate rabbi is immediate, the Associate Rabbi Search chairs, as an interim measure, focused on bringing us rabbinic support for the first period of transition following Rav Adam's departure. The chairs, the Board and Rav Baruch have agreed to fill the "position" of associate rabbi on an initial basis with two Toronto rabbis, known to most members and familiar with our community. They will serve as part of Rav Baruch's team. This arrangement will begin April 1, 2018 and extend through Sukkot. By then, the Associate Rabbi Search Committee will have confirmed longer term resources to ensure continued rabbinic coverage until the arrival of our new senior rabbi in 2019.

Welcome Interim Rabbis Jennifer Gorman and Moshe Meirovich We are pleased to welcome these experienced rabbis to Beth Tzedec. They will provide excellent spiritual leadership and serve member needs while the search committees continue their work. Both rabbis have the knowledge, experience and ability to support our membership pastorally, ritually and educationally. Rav Moshe and Ray Jen will be at shul on alternate Shabbatot and will take turns leading and speaking at services. Both will report to and work under Rav Baruch and will be available to all members during the week. If you wish to meet with either or both, please email them directly or contact Marlene Laba at mlaba@beth-tzedec.org to set up an appointment.

What Happens Next?

The search process for new spiritual leadership takes time and demands the input and confidence of the membership. Working with DRG, the Senior Rabbi Search Committee has been meeting with members representing key cohorts of our Congregation, as well as reviewing survey results to help refine the search.

As an important step in our process, we plan to invite selected candidates to guest weekends at Beth Tzedec. Members will have a chance to meet the candidates and experience them in action. We will advise the *kehillah* in advance of the dates. Following each visit, we will post a survey on our website that we invite you to complete. We need your feedback! The information you submit will add valuable insights to help us determine which candidates we wish to pursue.

How Can We Follow and Be Part of the Process?

We will update membership regularly on our progress on both searches via our e-newsletter and website. At all times, we invite you to forward to us comments, and to share the names of prospective candidates that you may know or have heard about in your travels. Hesed Report

Out of the Cold 2018

The 19th season of Out of the Cold concluded on March 20. We had a very harsh winter, and thankfully, we were able to provide a warm and safe refuge for the homeless. As you all know, the homeless situation in Toronto has reached a crisis point. We are very excited that through the Interfaith Coalition to Fight Homelessness-of which Rav Baruch is a part-we have formed an effective partnership with the Canadian Mental Health Association. This partnership provided for two caseworkers at the shelter every Tuesday evening for 9 weeks. It was the first time in the 32 year history of the OOTC program that an initiative of this magnitude was undertaken, and we are thrilled that it happened at our shelter. The highly trained staff offered advice on matters concerning housing, mental and physical health, employment issues and substance abuse. Often our guests do not know where to turn for help, and this initiative has been a lifesaver for many of them.

Our Mindfulness Program, which began three years ago as a partnership with the Centre for Mindfulness Studies, also offered our guests the opportunity to de-stress.

An important part of our OOTC program is the Art Circle, where guests have the opportunity to express their creativity while boosting their self-esteem. Beginners and experienced artists alike gather each week and create magnificent pieces of art. The annual Out of the Cold Art Show & Sale was held on Sunday, March 18, showcasing the talents and works of the participants. Proceeds benefit the artists directly, with a small percentage funding the OOTC program.
