# Constructive Conflict, Compassionate Listening and Community Building



**TWO JEWS, THREE OPINIONS. IRONICALLY, WE AGREE THAT JEWS** don't agree. *Mahloket*, conflict, seems built in to our gene pool. As we cycle through the weekly selections of Torah, conflict jumps out at the reader: sibling strife in Genesis, master-slave discord in Exodus and leadership disputes in Numbers. The Torah is actually conflicted about conflict, applauding Kalev, who disagreed with those who feared entering the Land of Promise and welcoming the principled dissent of the daughters of Tzlofhad, who wanted a share of the inheritance of their father, but criticizing Korah, who opposed the leadership of Moshe. What made two desirable and the third problematic? I suggest that the difference was a deep love for the land of Israel—by Kalev and the five daughters—rather than a desire for power and authority from Korah and his gang.

Disagreement is disagreeable, but sometimes warranted and desirable. The 1986 tragedy of the Space Shuttle Challenger was attributed to design flaws and a management structure that bypassed engineering concerns. Warnings about the insufficiency of the Phoenix pay system were not welcomed leading to a failure that is costing Canadian taxpayers billions of dollars to remedy. Healthy democracies and organizations validate and support dissent. However, individuals who raise objections may find themselves under tremendous stress as they seek to balance personal belief in doing the right thing with job survival.

During the Vietnam War, the United States Department of State developed the *Dissent Channel* to enable diplomats to safely articulate disagreement on substantive policy issues. The *Dissent Channel* enabled diplomats to protest the 2003 bombing of Iraq, the 2016 decision of President Obama to pull back from attacking Syria for using nerve gas and restrictions on entry to the United States imposed in the early days of the Trump administration. Still, foreign service professionals know that dissent is more honoured in the abstract than in practice. Leaders fear disagreement that can weaken an initiative or rip apart a community. As Richard Haass put it, "Speaking truth to power is [often] resented or rejected. ... Sometimes it is better to confront, other times it makes more sense to work around. Sometimes it is better to leave, other times to stay."

Israelis learned the value of dissent the hard way. The 1973 consensus that Egypt would not attack Israel led to

the disaster of the Yom Kippur War. Subsequently, Israeli military intelligence, responding to the danger of "group think," developed an internal dissent process. The *Ipkha Mistabra* (Devil's Advocate) Unit is tasked with arguing against proposed plans submitted to diplomatic and military leadership.

Our rabbinic tradition associates the Holy One with shalom and describes the Torah as having "paths of peace". Yet the Talmud is characterized by intense debate among the ancient rabbis. Even though law follows the consensus of the majority, tractate *Eduyyot* indicates that the practice of recording minority opinions is because future law may be built on the dissent of earlier scholars.

The Talmud tells of how conflict erupted between the students of the two houses leading to violent disagreement over eighteen legal issues, ultimately leading to the deaths of 3,000 students (Shabbat 17a). It also recounts the mutual respect of Beit Hillel and Beit Shammai, whose disagreements were based on the principle that "each of these opinions are the word of the living God" (Eruvin 13b).

Balancing respect for loyalty and dissent is at the heart of contemporary Jewish life. Increasingly, we see Israeli and Diaspora Jews disagreeing on political decisions, religious policies and cultural life. A survey released by the American Jewish Committee in June revealed agreement about the importance of the relationship of the two communities, but also detailed deep divisions between Israeli and US Jews. These divisions are reflected in synagogues where communities facing challenges balancing volatile political and ideological view avoid serious conversations in order to maintain a veneer of harmony.

Recently, a conflict erupted over remarks by the writer Michael Chabon at the Los Angeles commencement of Hebrew Union College, the Reform movement's seminary and training institution. He decried boundaries, borders and binary thinking. Going beyond the argument that intermarried couples, their children and their non-Jewish family members ought to be welcomed warmly by the Jewish community, Chabon argued against efforts to encourage Jews marrying Jews. Chabon went on to criticize Israel. "Security is an invention of humanity's jailers. … Security for some means imprisonment for all."

Intermarriage and Israel. Lines were quickly drawn.

Words became nasty and angry. Chabon spoke with anger and negativity, brushing aside the desire to maintain Jewish life, tradition and belief, and the need of Israel to protect its citizens. But the criticism has also been full of vindictiveness.

*Mahloket* is a valuable part of the Jewish tradition. The question is how to structure such disputation. The destruction of the second Jerusalem Temple, marked on the 9<sup>th</sup> of Av (this year, July 22), is often attributed to "groundless hatred," conflict gone wild.

In past summers, I have participated in discussions and study in the Residence of the President of Israel on how to prevent or ameliorate conflict in Israeli society. The model of *mahloket l'shem shamayim*, "disagreement for the sake of Heaven", must be strengthened. It is important to develop the techniques and skills for constructive conflict and respectful disagreement. This requires learning the skill of empathetic listening, encouraging an openness to learn from those who disagree with us and (maybe, hopefully) developing a willingness to manage a relationship in a positive and not destructive manner. The Pardes Institute in Jerusalem has created a program, the *9 Adar Project*, for this purpose.

Gershom Scholem accused Hannah Arendt, the author of *Eichmann in Jerusalem*, of lacking "love of the Jewish people". Scholem wrote to Arendt: "In the Jewish tradition there is a concept, hard to define and yet concrete enough, which we know as *Ahavat Israel*: 'Love of the Jewish people.' You, Hannah, lack that quality." If we begin with love, with a mutual desire to work for a common good, we will find ways to use our conflicts to build stronger communities, develop better solutions and forge deeper, more meaningful relationships. If not, we'll just have deep disputation, with no one listening or learning from the conflict.

## IN MOMENT MAGAZINE'S ARTICLE BY GEORGE JOHNSON

("What Will the Jewish World Look Like In 2050?"), the author recalls the famous 1964 *LOOK* magazine prediction that by the year 2000, the Jewish people would have disappeared. A quick tour of the world discovers that nothing could be further from the truth!

Our people are proudly represented and practicing our faith in every corner of the globe, there are museums and organizations and, of course, synagogues. Where once our houses of worship were built and then burned in Europe, many of those holy places are being rebuilt and used by locals and visitors.

While we still face the challenges of assimilation, anti-Semitism, threats to Israel and lower birth rates, 94 percent of those surveyed in the 2013 Pew Report said that they were proud of being Jewish. # A Deeply Meaningful Life

Judaism allows us to slow down, make time and lean into the things in our life that are deeply meaningful



### WHEN WE HEAR THE TERM 'COUNTER-CULTURE', IT

usually causes us to think about a group of people who went against the grain: suffragettes of the early 20<sup>th</sup> century, hippies of the late 1960s, more open LGBTQ communities in the 1970s through 1990s, and even the hipster generation of the 2010s. In each case, though, what was once labelled as counter-cultural eventually became an accepted, if not dominant, strand within the broader cultural narrative. What was new, non-traditional, rejectionist or radical became the norm, the acceptable, and in some cases the mainstream.

It is much harder to think of examples of something mainstream becoming counter-cultural, outside of those who hold on to old technology as newer inventions disrupt and displace (think of the revived trend of vinyl records among young people). Yet, in many of my conversations about Jewish life and synagogue life, I'm finding myself describing my vision of Jewish living and connection as counter-cultural.

Some of these themes are rather obvious. Turning off a smartphone for 25 hours each week is something that cuts against our dominant culture's obsession with social media, gaming and up-to-the-minute knowledge about news or a friend's thoughts. Other themes, though, are more subtle. The act of gathering in person in community is now a counter-cultural act. This trend was identified almost 20 years ago by Harvard political scientist Robert Putnam in his book *Bowling Alone*, where he noted, as an example, increases in the number of bowlers but a decline in bowling league participation in American from the 1970s to the 1990s.

So, when the dominant cultural norm is for people to gather as a community with less frequency, then what is a community institution, like a synagogue, and a religious group that relies on community, like Judaism, to do? Do we adapt to the realities of our time and make changes? Do we accept market forces for what they are and reorient to be market driven? To be a bit hyperbolic, do we reduce the number of people needed for a minyan to seven, because we might struggle to reach ten? Or, conversely, do we stand rigid and firm against the cultural changes that surround us, holding firm to our beliefs and values even if we are seeing fewer and fewer people wanting to engage with them?

I'd like to suggest a third way, a path that doesn't mean compromising centuries of tradition but that also doesn't seem rigid and protectionist: the notion of counter-culture. Why did counter-cultures take hold? What made them—to use Malcolm Gladwell's term sticky? They spoke to people and were meaningful. They were a form of rejection of the present cultural norms and an aspiration for a better future. While most countercultural movements were innovative in the sense that they brought forward new ideas, a Jewish counter-cultural renaissance would be more like vinyl records; returning to something old because of a belief that newer is not always better.

What could this look like for Toronto Jews? It could mean carving out Shabbat morning as family time spent within a broader synagogue community—be it to pray, to play, to learn or to schmooze. It could mean a commitment to Jewish learning, not only for children but also for parents and mature adults. It could mean making the time to engage in more Jewish rituals, be it building a sukkah or baking *hallah*. It could mean reading Jewish books and blogs, listening to Jewish music and podcasts.

Ultimately, it means slowing down, making time and leaning in to the things in our life that seem outdated, but upon further reflection, are deeply meaningful: family time; building relationships with and within a community; singing together; eating together; letting children authentically explore and question.

And if 'the man' thinks this is too utopian for the reality of the 21<sup>st</sup> century, then that's a sign that we're on the right path. Because in all of the examples of counterculture I listed above, society ended up for the better as a result. My vision for Jewish living is that we achieve the same goal.

# Moving from Acceptance to Celebration

Pearl Cohen provides the first article in a new series where young Beth Tzedec members share their voices and perspectives on being lewish under 40.

#### LIKE SO MANY OTHERS, I INHERITED MY MEMBERSHIP TO

Beth Tzedec. My Bubbe and Zayde were members before I was born. My parents were married in the Rabbi's office. It was my first shul as a baby before my parents moved our family to Ottawa, where I grew up. When my partner and I eventually moved to Toronto and were shul shopping, we went to Reform synagogues. They were lovely and spiritual and inclusive—but I am a Conservative Jew.

I always had to leave my queerness at the door when I went to shul as a teenager, which eventually meant I stopped going. But I never stopped wanting that connection, that community. My familiarity with social exclusion and systemic persecution didn't originate in my queerness, but in my Jewishness. Being Jewish means I have a framework for those struggles against oppression and how it shapes our daily lives. Being queer isn't just about sexuality or gender. Like Judaism, it's a perspective that influences how I move through the world and society.

As Jews, our very existence feels like an act of defiance and survival. Despite how willing we are to assimilate, we carry in ourselves an "otherness" that we often hide to access respectability and acceptance in the world. But when we walk into a shul, we know who we are, and we know that we belong. Despite differences in our traditions, our diasporic roots, our politics, we are all Jews.

I still struggle to feel that unity and equality within the Jewish community. I still find myself singled out at times in our community for being queer, as if it differentiates my Jewishness from other members'. But the thing is: My Judaism is queer. My queerness is an essential part of who I am, as much as my Jewish identity. These identities are intertwined and, in many ways, inseparable for me. I wouldn't be as queer if I wasn't Jewish.

Conservative Judaism has changed since I was a teenager. Experiences of LGBTQ+ (Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer, and so much more) Jews have shifted from embarrassed silence to tolerance to, finally, acceptance. I want us to move forward, to keep going from acceptance to celebration. And more than just words, we need to take deliberate and meaningful action to include LGBTQ+ people in synagogue life—in both ritual and community. Same-sex marriage is one of the first steps that we can look forward to, but it isn't the be-all end-all, of LGBTQ+ inclusion.

June was Pride month in Toronto. Pride is about resistance, liberation, fighting against oppression and I can't think of anything more Jewish than that. The recognition of LGBTQ+ pride at synagogue shows the strides that our shul is making in inclusivity and the respect and love they have for their members. It also demonstrates the support the community is willing to give. It means that when I step in the door, I can say, "This is all of me." No part of my identity is left outside.
