## Candlelighting for the Two-Day Festival.

**Thursday evening May 28, 2020:** Candlelighting no later than 8:31 p.m. Prior to lighting Yom Tov candles, light a Yahrtzeit candle which will burn for 24 hours to be used for lighting a Yizkor candle and Shabbat/Yom candles the following evening.

**Friday evening May 29, 2020:** Prior to lighting Shabbat/Yom Tov candles, light a second 24-hr Yahrtzeit candle to serve as the Yizkor candle which will burn through the end of the festival on Saturday night. Do this from the pre-existing flame of the Yahrtzeit candle lit on Thursday night. Then light Shabbat/Yom Tov candles from one of the pre-existing flames no later than 8:32 p.m.

Another Easier Option: Prior to the start of Shavuot light a 48-hr. candle to be used for the Yom Tov candles on Thursday night at 8:31 p.m., the Yizkor candle prior to Shabbat, and the Shabbat candles on Friday night at 8:32 p.m. Some people designate the 48-hr candle as the Yizkor candle and do not light a separate candle that burns through the end of the second day.
