Services

Which Services are Right for You?

Sanctuary Service

This service starts at 8:00 am on both days of Rosh Hashanah, 7:00 pm on Kol Nidrei and 9:00 am on Yom Kippur. Led by Rabbi Baruch Frydman-Kohl, Howard Black and Cantor Simon Spiro, it features inspiring, soulful interpretations of traditional liturgy with the accompaniment of the Beth Tzedec Singers, insightful Torah commentary and a topical sermon that draws upon classical sources. This service is planned to conclude by 1:00 pm on Rosh Hashanah and 10:00 pm on Kol Nidrei.

Parallel Service

Held in the Kimel Family Gvm. this service starts at 8:30 am on both days of Rosh Hashanah, 7:00 pm on Kol Nidrei and 9:00 am on Yom Kippur. Led by Rabbi Adam Cutler, Cantor Sidney Ezer and Ritual Director Lorne Hanick, this more intimate gathering emphasizes congregational participation and singing. Come for the engaging prayers, the warm atmosphere and the astute Torah commentary. This service usually concludes before 1:00 pm on Rosh Hashanah and before 10:00 pm on Kol Nidrei.

Songs and Stories for Young Children and Their Families

This Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur program is an adaptation of a traditional service for kids ages 0 to 5 and their family members. It will be led by Aily Leibtag, Youth Director, beginning at 11:00 am in the Orenstein Mezzanine Hall. Gather for High Holy Day stories and songs, fun engagement and child-friendly activities.

Family Service

For children ages 6 and up and their family members, this Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur service starts at 10:30 am in the Hendeles Chapel, On Kol Nidrei, a one-hour sevice begins at 7:00 pm. Led by Andre Ivory, it is an abbreviated service that emphasizes participation. Come for the songs. inspirational stories. comments and insights. The setting is intimate and the atmosphere is lively, welcoming and fun!

Learners' Service

Back after a number of years, this Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur program is led by Daniel Silverman, Director of Education & Family Programming. Beginning at 10:30 am in the Hurwich Board Room, the informal Learners' Service will feature exploration of

selected High Holy Day themes and ideas. Participants will learn about the traditional liturgy and its melodies. Using classical and modern texts, this service will include stimulating discussion, provoking thoughtful self-reflection.

Youth Programs & Babysitting

Educational and fun programming is provided for children in JK to Grade 7 (ages 4 to 12), including activities, snacks and games. Check in on the Second Floor via Staircase A and follow signs for room locations. Babysitting is also available for children ages 0 to 3, but only with advance reservations. See page 13 for the sign-up form.

Please inform our staff of any special needs or arrangements regarding your child (e.g. allergies, pick-up by another relative, etc.). All parents are asked to pick up their children immediately after the conclusion of the Adult services. If you pick up your child before the conclusion of services, please inform a Youth Staff member that your child is leaving for the day.

Prayer Books

Please bring your own copy of the Silverman *Maḥzor*. We do not sell *maḥzorim*. They are available from local Judaica stores and online.

Each year, many maḥzorim are accidentally left behind. Before the High Holy Days, please write your name and phone number inside your maḥzor so that we may contact you to return any lost books.

Health Concerns

In case of fainting or illness, contact the nearest Usher. Please note that space along the curb on Warwick Avenue will be cordoned off to allow access for Emergency Vehicles, in case someone requires medical attention.

The Lounge is available throughout the High Holy

Days for persons with health problems. There will be food if needed.

Attire

Please remember that appropriate dress should be worn for a synagogue service. Synagogue attire should reflect the importance of spending the High Holy Days in a House of God. For men, a jacket and tie are encouraged. For women, bare legs are acceptable, but bare shoulders and short skirts are not.

Enhancement for the Hearing Impaired

If you are hearing impaired, please call Avital at 416-781-3511 as soon as possible to arrange to borrow one of our special hearing aids, so that it can be reserved and held for you at the Check Room.

Saving of Seats

As a courtesy to all Beth Tzedec members, the Ushers are instructed to fill vacant seats after 10:30 am on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur mornings and after 6:30 pm on Kol Nidrei night. (The only exceptions are those seats marked officially reserved.) Please note that loose articles cannot be used to reserve seats. Such articles will be removed and taken to a storage room.

Our Ushers are member volunteers. **Please** cooperate and afford them the respect they deserve.

Decorum During Services and in the Building

Please refrain from movement in the aisles when the Rabbi is talking, when the Aron Kodesh is open, and when people are standing in prayer. In addition, the Sanctuary doors will be closed during the Rabbi's sermon, and no one will be permitted to enter.

For safety and security reasons, please do not congregate in the foyer. Noise in the foyer disturbs congregants' praying and learning.

Children must be supervised by their parents at all times, unless they are in the Youth Service or under the care of our babysitters.

Children are welcome at all Beth Tzedec services. When coming with children to the Sanctuary or Parallel service, please feel free to bring along quiet toys and books. To respect our Shabbat and High Holy Day observance in shul, we recommend sticker books, as writing and colouring are not permitted. Please do not use any electronic games or cell phones.

Changing Stations and Nursing Mothers

Both the Men's and Ladies' washrooms have a changing station. The Bride's Room is available for nursing mothers. Please ask the Ushers or Synagogue staff for directions.

Feeding Children on Yom Kippur

Younger children (through Grade 4) will be served cookies and juice in the Youth Service/program areas. Other children who plan to eat may bring a pareve snack to room 204.

Babysitting

Babysitting will be available from 9:30 am on both days of Rosh Hashanah, from 6:45 pm on Kol Nidrei, and from 10:00 am on Yom Kippur. Again this year, babysitting services are being provided by Wee Care.

To ensure a safe and secure environment for your children, Beth Tzedec engages the services of professional babysitters, based on specific staff-to-child ratios. In order to hire the appropriate number of babysitters, it is important that parents register their children in advance.

Registrations for babysitting must be received by Wednesday, August 28 at 5:00 pm.

Parents are asked to check in with the babysitting staff from time to time in order to ensure that their children are comfortable and content. Parents should also supply name tags to be pinned to the back of their children's garments. In addition. parents of children under 2 years of age should provide a bottle, blanket, carriage or stroller and a toy for their child. (All items should be clearly labeled.)

High Holy Day Parking Around Beth Tzedec

As reported last year, the following rules and considerations apply to parking around Beth Tzedec during the High Holy Days:

We have been told that parking *tickets WILL BE issued* in the case of violations of any of the following prohibitions:

No Parking within 9 metres of an Intersection; No Standing; No Stopping; No Blocking Driveways; No Stopping on Sidewalks; No Parking on Boulevards; No Parking too close to Fire Hydrants; No Parking on Fire Routes, Rush Hour Routes, Permit Parking Streets, and Pay and Display Streets; and other prohibitions relating to safety.

Police are obligated to enforce the above by-laws should a complaint be received.

Based on discussions with Councillor Joe Mihevc and our local Area Parking Supervisor, we have been advised that congregants *should NOT expect leniency in respect of all parking violations*; however, we've been told that consideration will be granted *only for violations of time-based laws* such as "One Hour Only" and "Three Hour Only" and "No Parking Anytime" (on one-way streets only, but *not during rush hour*). Should you receive a Notice of Infraction for one of these laws, please take it for withdrawal to one of the locations listed on the reverse side of the ticket.

Additionally, note that double-sided parking may be permitted on *one-way* streets which are wide enough to allow sufficient space to be available at all times for emergency vehicles to have clear access to the street. Because of the judgment to be applied here by an officer, there is a risk of receiving a ticket in this circumstance. Please note that *double-sided parking is not permitted on two-way streets*. Wherever you do park, please position your car tightly to the curb.

We encourage our members to consider walking, bicycling, car-pooling, requesting the use of a neighbourhood friend's driveway, or taking the TTC. We hope that these guidelines, provided by the police and the city, will help you avoid receiving parking tickets during the upcoming High Holy Day season.


